## 14. <u>SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY MID-YEAR REVIEW OF THE FISCAL YEAR</u> 2022-23 OPERATING BUDGET

Director of Finance and Administration, Amy Chang, stated that SEJPA provides wastewater treatment and disposal, water recycling, and technical support to local clean-water programs. In providing these services, SEJPA seeks to accomplish its mission in an environmentally, socially, and fiscally responsible manner. The total budget for Fiscal Year 2022-23 is \$13,679,161, which includes operating expense of \$8,911,445, capital expense of \$3,180,000, and debt service of \$1,587,716.

Total operating expenses for FY 2022-23 are expected to be under budget by \$136,488 or 1.5%. Seven of the eleven operating programs are tracking under budget, with the remaining four programs tracking between 0.6% and 8.6% over budget. The recycled water program is projected to produce revenues of \$4,511,854. This would be \$275,058 greater than budget and that would result in \$1,390,671 of net revenue over expenses.

## 15. <u>CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATE</u>

Director of Infrastructure and Sustainability, Tom Falk, presented a status update on the agency's capital improvement program, which includes replacing aging and obsolescent facilities, as well as that enhance environmental protection, resource recovery, sustainability.

Mr. Falk highlighted recently completed capital projects that were bundled into phases to prioritize capital spending, streamline project delivery, minimize community impacts, and reduce cost through economies of scale. Funding for these projects was provided by the 2017 Clean Water Bond Issuance, recycled water sales, capital cash contributions from agencies served by the SEJPA, grants, and Caltrans for the bike and pedestrian path.

Mr. Falk stated that looking forward, staff has identified four projects totaling an estimated cost of approximately \$17.2M that are recommended to be designed and constructed over the next three years. These projects are in addition to the recently awarded Biosolids Dewatering Facility Improvement Project, which construction is scheduled to be completed in 2025. These projects advance the agency's sustainability and climate action goals, as well as provide increased service reliability. Staff has been successful in securing grant funding for three of the four projects and is using multi-agency collaboration to help advance the projects. Staff anticipates providing more information on these projects at the next Board meeting.

Mr. Falk stated that looking beyond 2025, staff is preparing to update its facility planning documents to align SEJPA's vision, service priorities, and infrastructure needs to create a roadmap for the next 10+ years. The updated facility planning will build off the 2015 Facility Plan and leverage more recent studies focused on process optimization and facility upgrades to improve the ability to manage variable flows and loads, reduce process challenges, and position SEJPA for potable reuse. The facility planning approach will maintain the momentum of ongoing capital projects and allow for continued development of near-term projects while reaffirming strategies for future initiatives. Regulatory changes, drought conditions, asset management, and SEJPA's vision for expanding reuse are anticipated to drive project prioritization. Staff plans to retain an engineering firm in 2023 to prepare an updated Facility Plan that will outline the capital program priorities over the period of 2025 to 2035.

## 16. <u>GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT</u>

General Manager, Michael Thornton, reported on the wastewater treatment and disposal agreement with City of Del Mar, that expires June 30, 2045. General Manager Thornton explained that the agreement includes an annual credit of \$60,000 to Del Mar from the SEJPA to offset a portion of costs incurred by Del Mar for building the connecting pipeline that sends wastewater to the San Elijo Water Campus. The credit is in effect until 66% of connecting pipeline costs are recovered by Del Mar. The current outstanding balance on the pipeline payoff is \$760,564, and payments are anticipated to be completed in 2036. However, if Del Mar elects to terminate the agreement early, there would be no debt cost to SEJPA.

## 17. <u>GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT</u>

Senior Associate of Procopio Kevin Davis explained that the State of Emergency is due to end on February 28, 2023. The new AB-2449 is now in effect, as of January 1, 2023. AB-2449 allows for Board Members to participate in a Board Meeting remotely given certain conditions are met. Davis cited the SEJPA Board Meeting Remote Appearance Form, which the Board Member would need to submit to SEJPA with at least 72 hours' notice and with confirmation of a quorum present, among other qualifications.

## DISCUSSION

## Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of January 2023. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. Treatment levels for **CBOD** and **TSS** were **98.3** and **98.2** percent removal, respectively, during the month of January.



Figure 1 (below) shows historic treatment performance trends for the removal of CBOD and TSS over the last 13 months compared to the permit minimum removal requirement of 85%.



Figures 2 and 3 (below) show historic influent vs effluent CBOD and TSS concentration fluctuations in the strength of the wastewater being received and discharged by the SEJPA.

## Member Agency Flows

Table 1 (below) presents the influent and effluent flows for the month of January. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was calculated for the San Elijo Water Campus. Approximately 8% of the influent flow was diverted for recycled water use in January.

Also shown in Figure 4 is the total wastewater treatment capacity of the water campus, 5.25 mgd, of which each Member Agency has the right to 2.2 mgd, Rancho Santa Fe Community Service District leases 0.25 mgd, and the City of Del Mar leases 0.60 mgd.



## City of Escondido Flows

The average and peak flow rate for the month of January 2023 from the City of Escondido's Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility, which discharges through the San Elijo Ocean Outfall, is reported below in Table 3.

## DISCUSSION

## Recycled Water Production

For the month of January 2022, recycled water demand was 15.9 acre-feet (AF), which was met using 15.6 AF of recycled water and supplemented with 0.3 AF of potable water. January demand was 66.8% below budget expectations of 48 AF due to heavy rain. However, the total water production of 1,049 AF for the first seven months of FY 2022-23 was above budget by 6.6%.

Figure 1 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning the last 10 fiscal years, with the overlay of annual rainfall. Since the recycled water program primarily serves outdoor irrigation, annual demand is reduced during wet periods and increases during times of drought. Figure 2 (attached) shows the monthly recycled water demand for each January for the last ten years to provide a year-over-year comparison. Figure 3 (attached) compares budget versus actual recycled water sales for FY 2022-23.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Confirm the continuation of the Agreement with GEM Site Development, LLC pursuant to San Elijo Joint Power Authority's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures" and Public Contract Code 22050, pending completion of final grind and overlay pavement restoration with total costs not to exceed estimated value of \$50,000.

## BACKGROUND

The San Elijo JPA's recycled water system consists of a "north system" and a "south system", both of which are supplied by recycled water produced at the San Elijo Water Campus. On Sunday, February 5<sup>th</sup>, wet pavement was observed just east of the intersection of the Water Campus entrance on Manchester Avenue. As reported to the Board on February 21<sup>st</sup>, SEJPA investigated the situation and enacted emergency provisions of our Purchasing Policy and Procedures to retain a local pipeline contractor, GEM Site Development, LLC (GEM) under a time and materials (T&M) contract. SEJPA's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures", Part 3.1.d provided for emergency contract in this situation under the General Manager's authority:

The General Manager is authorized to purchase and enter into contracts for urgent maintenance and for necessary equipment, services and supplies in the case of an emergency, without giving notice for bids and in any necessary amount. Urgent sewer maintenance or repair work is work that is required as a result of a physical condition which threatens public health or safety or the environment and requires immediate remedial action to mitigate said threat. Following the exercise of this authority, the General Manager or designee shall follow the procedures required by Section 22050 of the Public Contract Code.

The Contractor located a leak at an existing service saddle on February 6<sup>th</sup>. Under SEJPA's direction, GEM proceeded with repair work including material purchases, removing a section of damaged pipe, and replacement of the pipe with repair couplings, joint restraints and a new service saddle. Trench preparation, pipe bedding, backfill and trench repair were completed in

accordance with City of Encinitas standards on February 10<sup>th</sup>. Pursuant to City of Encinitas requirements, the Contractor is to return to perform a grind and overlay patch on the trench.

Pursuant to Section 22050 of the Public Contract Code (PCC) SEJPA is to provide an update to the governing Board until the action (here, the emergency repair contract) is terminated:

22050, Paragraph (c)(1) ...[following action by General Manager under authority delegated in SEJPA's Procurement Policy]...the governing body shall initially review the emergency action not later than seven days after the action, or at its next regularly scheduled meeting if that meeting will occur not later than 14 days after the action, and at least at every regularly scheduled meeting thereafter until the action is terminated, to determine, by a four-fifths vote, that there is a need to continue the action, unless ...[General Manager as delegated authority]...has terminated that action prior to the governing body reviewing the emergency action and making a determination pursuant to this subdivision. If the governing body meets weekly, it may, after the initial review, review the emergency action in accordance with this paragraph every 14 days.

## DISCUSSION

Although the pipeline repair is complete, GEM needs to return to do a final pavement restoration consistent with the City's paving requirements (to allow for correction of settling), which is typical follow-up work. Per City's requirements, GEM is obtaining a permit to do this work. After this final work is performed, SEJPA will coordinate with GEM to reconcile the time and materials charges in order to approve and pay-out GEM's final invoice. After this final reconciliation is performed the General Manager will terminate the time and materials contract with GEM.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

Funding for this emergency event will be allocated from the recycled water reserve fund. Board Action on February 21, 2023 confirmed the Emergency Condition and ratified the emergency repair contract with GEM Site Development, LLC for an amount not to exceed an estimated value of \$50,000. SEJPA is monitoring the T&M costs and does not anticipate the repair work to exceed the authorized amount.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Confirm the continuation of the Agreement with GEM Site Development, LLC pursuant to San Elijo Joint Power Authority's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures" and Public Contract Code 22050, pending completion of final grind and overlay pavement restoration.

## RECOMMENDATION

\*

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Review and Confirm this Emergency Condition pursuant to San Elijo Joint Power Authority's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures" and Public Contract Code 22050, and ratify the General Manager's execution of emergency repair agreement with Ahrens Mechanical for repairs to recycled water pipeline on the San Elijo Water Campus with repair costs not to exceed estimated value of \$50,000.

## BACKGROUND

The San Elijo JPA's recycled water system was originally constructed and put into operation in October 2000 to serve non-potable demands within the communities of Encinitas, Solana Beach, and Del Mar. The system generally consists of a "north system" and a "south system", both of which are supplied by recycled water produced at the San Elijo Water Campus.

The original backbone recycled water infrastructure has performed reliably for over 20 years, experiencing only occasional leaks over that period of operation. The expected useful life of a distribution system of this type and use is estimated at +70 years. Leaks in distribution systems occur on occasion and can be attributed to soils that accelerate corrosion, construction defects, or operating characteristics outside of the design parameters. Detecting, locating, and fixing leaks is part of SEJPA's regular operating and maintenance responsibilities.

Leaks are not readily predictable and may result in injury to persons and damage to property, as well as permit violations, loss of a resource, and economic loss to SEJPA and/or others, among other potential damages. Therefore, when a leak is detected, immediate attention and action is necessary to respond to the emergency. Such work is commonly completed under Emergency Work provisions of SEJPA's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures", Part 3.1.d which states:

The General Manager is authorized to purchase and enter into contracts for urgent maintenance and for necessary equipment, services and supplies in the case of an emergency, without giving notice for bids and in any necessary amount. Urgent sewer maintenance or repair work is work that is required as a result of a physical condition which threatens public health or safety or the environment and requires immediate remedial action to mitigate said threat. Following the exercise of this authority, the General Manager or designee shall follow the procedures required by Section 22050 of the Public Contract Code.

Section 22050 of the Public Contract Code (PCC) stipulates requirements for reporting the action to the governing Board

22050, Paragraph (c)(1) ...[following action by General Manager under authority delegated in SEJPA's Procurement Policy]...the governing body shall initially review the emergency action not later than seven days after the action, or at its next regularly scheduled meeting if that meeting will occur not later than 14 days after the action, and at least at every regularly scheduled meeting thereafter until the action is terminated, to determine, by a four-fifths vote, that there is a need to continue the action, unless ...[General Manager as delegated authority]...has terminated that action prior to the governing body reviewing the emergency action and making a determination pursuant to this subdivision. If the governing body meets weekly, it may, after the initial review, review the emergency action in accordance with this paragraph every 14 days.

## DISCUSSION

On Monday, March 6<sup>th</sup>, a leak was observed on the Water Campus, just north of the chlorine contact tank (See Photo 1, below). SEJPA promptly investigated the situation, shutdown the "north system" transmission main, and notified the City of Encinitas and customers affected by the shutdown. The General Manager determined that immediate action was necessary to restore recycled water system operations and that the repair would constituted an emergency pursuant to SEJPA's policies, and that the urgency of an emergency repair would not allow for the time necessary to complete a competitive solicitation for bids. A local pipeline contractor, Ahrens Mechanical (Ahrens) was contacted and agreed to mobilize a crew to immediately support the repair under an emergency, time and materials contract. The General Manager thereafter executed an Emergency Services Agreement with Ahrens (see Attachment 1) in accordance with the emergency work provisions described above.

Starting on Wednesday, March 8<sup>th</sup>, Ahrens mobilized equipment, operators and laborers to excavate the location identified by SEJPA (See Photo 2, below). The leak was discovered to be a hole caused by corrosion (See Photo 3, below) and with SEJPA's approval, Ahrens proceeded with repair work including material purchases, removing a section of damaged pipe, and replacement of the pipe with repair couplings, and joint restraints (See Photo 4, below). Trench preparation, pipe bedding, backfill and asphalt surface restoration will be completed in accordance with applicable standards. The "north system" transmission main was offline from Monday, March 6<sup>th</sup> through the afternoon of Thursday, March 9<sup>th</sup>. After repair work is complete, SEJPA will coordinate with Ahrens to reconcile the time and materials charges in order to approve and pay-out Ahren's final invoice. After this final reconciliation is performed the General Manager will terminate the time and materials contract with Ahrens.





## FINANCIAL IMPACT

Funding for this emergency event will be allocated from the recycled water reserve fund.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Review and Confirm this Emergency Condition pursuant to San Elijo Joint Power Authority's Resolution 2022-01 "Purchasing Policies and Procedures" and Public Contract Code 22050, and ratify the General Manager's execution of emergency repair agreement with Ahrens Mechanical for repairs to recycled water pipeline on the San Elijo Water Campus with repair costs not to exceed estimated value of \$50,000.

## TECHNICAL SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY AND AHRENS MECHANICAL FOR EMERGENCY REPAIRS PROJECT

## RECITALS

- A. This Technical Service Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this 8<sup>th</sup> day of March, 2023 ("Effective Date"), by and between the SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY ("SEJPA") and AHRENS MECHANICAL, ("CONTRACTOR"), an independent contractor, with a principal place of business 5959 Mission Gorge Road, Ste. #204, San Diego, CA, 92120
- B. CONTRACTOR has responded to SEJPA's request to provide emergency repair services on existing 12" recycled water ductile iron pipe within San Elijo Water Campus located at 2695 Manchester Avenue, Cardiff by the Sea, CA 92007. SEJPA has been determined that it is in the best interests of SEJPA to enter into the Agreement hereinafter contained.
- C. In consideration of the mutual promises, conditions and covenants herein contained, the parties hereto agree to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

## AGREEMENT

## SECTION 1 SCOPE OF WORK

A. CONTRACTOR shall provide labor and services to complete the Scope of Work specified in **Attachment A** to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall furnish all materials, equipment, supplies and incidentals necessary to perform the work, except those which are expressly designated to be furnished by SEJPA. All work performed and materials supplied in the execution of this Agreement shall comply with applicable laws, standards, codes and regulations governing such materials, items and work. All material is guaranteed to be as specified in the Scope of Work. Any alteration or deviation from the specifications, which involve extra costs, must be approved by SEJPA in advance.

B. CONTRACTOR represents that it is skilled in the technical expertise necessary to provide the services required under this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall be licensed under the classification of Class A as the date of this Agreement and shall maintain such license until final completion and acceptance of the work specified in the Agreement. CONTRACTOR agrees to perform its work hereunder in a competent manner acceptable to SEJPA and in conformity with the requirements of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR will employ only competent workers to complete the work under this Agreement.

C. CONTRACTOR shall secure and maintain in good standing for the term of this Agreement any and all permits, licenses and certifications required to perform the Scope of Work. CONTRACTOR shall provide proof of any such permits and licensure upon request by SEJPA.

## SECTION 2 TIME OF PERFORMANCE

A. CONTRACTOR agrees to complete said work by March 15, 2023 to the entire satisfaction of SEJPA before final payment is made. Time is of the essence. The time for performance of any work under this Agreement may be extended, or suspended, in the reasonable discretion of SEJPA, based on unavoidable disruption of work due to strikes, lockouts, government acts, epidemics/pandemics, acts of God and other similar conditions shown by CONTRACTOR to be beyond the control of CONTRACTOR.

## SECTION 3 COMPENSATION

A. Compensation for all of the labor, equipment, material and services which CONTRACTOR is obligated to perform under the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including all applicable taxes, shall not exceed twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000). SEJPA shall make payments to CONTRACTOR in response to duly submitted invoices in accordance with this SECTION 3.

B. Prepayments will not be made, at any time, during the execution of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall submit monthly invoices to SEJPA for payments. Such invoices shall represent the value of the items delivered or services provided during the billing period. Such invoices shall be prepared in such form and supported by documentation as SEJPA may reasonably require including a brief narrative description of the work performed.

C. Payment shall be made by SEJPA to CONTRACTOR within forty-five (45) days of receipt of an approved invoice. The amount of this payment will be less any amounts previously paid on the account.

D. SEJPA shall review each invoice as soon as practicable after receipt for the purpose of determining whether the invoice should be approved as a proper payment request. SEJPA shall return to CONTRACTOR any invoice determined not to be a proper payment request as soon as practicable. The returned payment request shall include a written explanation setting forth the reasons why the payment request is not proper, and a proposed revised invoice amount, if any, that SEJPA believes to be the proper amount.

E. If CONTRACTOR accepts the proposed revised invoice prepared by SEJPA, CONTRACTOR shall provide written notification to SEJPA's designated representative that CONTRACTOR accepts the proposed revised invoice, and the revised invoice shall be deemed received on the same business day CONTRACTOR's written notification is received. SEJPA shall thereafter have 45 days to make payment on the revised invoice.

A. The Agreement period will continue until CONTRACTOR's completion of the Scope of Work attached hereto as "**Attachment A**" and expiration of the warranty of work. CONTRACTOR's indemnification, hold harmless and defense obligation shall survive the termination of expiration of this Agreement.

B. SEJPA may cancel this Agreement at any time with no less than ten (10) days' prior written notice. CONTRACTOR shall discontinue all affected work on the indicated date of termination.

C. The time for performance of any work under this Agreement may be extended, at SEJPA's discretion, based on unavoidable disruption of work due to strikes, lockouts, government acts, pandemics/epidemics, acts of God and other similar conditions shown by CONTRACTOR to be beyond the control of CONTRACTOR.

## SECTION 5 LEGAL RELATIONS

A. CONTRACTOR is for all purposes an independent contractor. All personnel provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement are to be employed by CONTRACTOR, or its subcontractors, for their account only. Neither CONTRACTOR, its employees nor subcontractors, shall be deemed to have been employees of SEJPA or to have been entitled to any rights or benefits as SEJPA employees. CONTRACTOR certifies that it is free from the control and direction of SEJPA in connection with the performance of the work. CONTRACTOR will supervise the work and control the means for accomplishment of the services and work to be performed hereunder. CONTRACTOR will be responsible for providing required and necessary protective gear for its personnel, including any subcontractor personnel, while on the job site, including safety equipment. No permitted or required approval by SEJPA of personnel, costs, schedules, documents or services of CONTRACTOR shall be construed as making SEJPA responsible for the manner in which CONTRACTOR performs its services. Such approvals are intended to give SEJPA the right to satisfy itself with the quality of work performed by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR further certifies that it is customarily engaged in an independently established trade, occupation, or business of the same nature as that involved in the work performed under this Agreement. This Agreement is not exclusive, and as such CONTRACTOR certifies that it is free to perform work for others for the duration of this Agreement.

B. CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend, protect, and hold SEJPA, its Member Agencies (the City of Solana Beach and the City of Encinitas), and each of their respective officers, officials, directors, agents, employees, and volunteers (collectively, "Indemnified Parties") harmless from and against any and all liability, claims, demands, damages, loss, charge, civil fines or penalties, liens, actions and causes of action, including reasonable attorney's fees, costs and expenses (collectively, "Claims"), arising out of the negligent acts, errors, omissions or willful misconduct of CONTRACTOR, its associates, employees, subcontractors or other agents in the performance of this Agreement or out of operations conducted by CONTRACTOR.

CONTRACTOR shall not be required to defend, indemnify or hold harmless Indemnified Parties for Claims to the extent attributable to the sole negligence, active negligence or willful misconduct of Indemnified Parties. The indemnification, hold harmless and defense obligations set forth herein shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

## SECTION 6 INSURANCE.

A. CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain during the term of this Agreement all insurance required by federal, state, county and local laws, and such other and additional coverage adequate to protect CONTRACTOR and SEJPA from any liabilities and claims for injuries and damages to persons or property which may arise from, or in connection with, the performance of work hereunder by CONTRACTOR, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. Specifically, CONTRACTOR and each of its subcontractors shall maintain throughout the term of this Agreement the following policies of insurance:

1. A general liability policy of insurance, including coverage for products and completed operations, bodily injury and/or death, personal and advertising injury, and property damage claims which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work under this Agreement by CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors, and each of their agents, representatives, or employees. General Liability insurance shall be comprehensive in form and shall be on a "per occurrence" basis in a minimum amount of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) per occurrence. Such coverage shall be written on Insurance Services Office ("ISO") Form CG 00 01, or equivalent.

2. An automobile liability policy of insurance to cover claims, injury, death, loss or damage, accidents from the use or operation of any automobiles, trucks and/or other mobile or stationary equipment, whether owned, non-owned or hire. Auto coverage shall be issued with a limit no less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident for bodily injury and property damage.

3. Workers' compensation insurance with limits no less than the statutory limits.

B. All policies of insurance required under this Section shall be from insurance providers who are either admitted or licensed to do business in California, or are Surplus Lines Carriers authorized to do business in California, and who have an A.M. Best Company rating of no less than A- and a financial size category of at least Class VII, unless otherwise acceptable to SEJPA.

C. All policies of insurance required under this Section, except for workers' compensation, shall be endorsed to name SEJPA, its member agencies the City of Solana Beach and City of Encinitas, and their directors, officers, employees and representatives (the "Additional Insureds") as additional insureds under each such policy and an additional insured endorsement at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37, if later revisions are used, shall be provided to SEJPA.

D. CONTRACTOR shall provide duly-authorized and, as applicable, executed original certificates and endorsements for all insurance required pursuant to this Agreement on forms approved by SEJPA in conformity with all requirements of this Agreement prior to commencement of any work hereunder. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall deliver renewal certificates to SEJPA at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.

E. For any claims related to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Additional Insureds. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Additional Insureds shall be excess of the CONTRACTOR's (and its subcontractor's) insurance, and shall not contribute to such insurance.

F. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared in writing and approved by SEJPA. At the option of SEJPA, either: the insurance provider(s) shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects SEJPA and its directors, officers, employees, and representatives; or the CONTRACTOR shall provide a financial guarantee satisfactory to SEJPA guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.

G. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to waive rights of subrogation against SEJPA and the Additional Insureds which any of CONTRACTOR's insurers may acquire from CONTRACTOR by virtue of the payment of any loss. CONTRACTOR agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation.

H. CONTRACTOR shall provide thirty (30) days' advance written notice to SEJPA, of any cancellation or material alteration of any insurance policy required herein.

## SECTION 7 ASSIGNMENTS/SUBCONTRACTS

CONTRACTOR shall not sublet or assign any of the work covered by this Agreement, except with the prior written approval of SEJPA and in strict compliance with the terms, provisions and conditions of this Agreement.

## SECTION 8 CONTRACTOR'S PROJECT MANAGER

CONTRACTOR's designated project manager, Jeff Barr, shall be empowered to act for CONTRACTOR for all matters relating to this Agreement.

## SECTION 9 SEJPA REPRESENTATIVE

SEJPA's designated representative, Michael Piper, will administer this Agreement.

## SECTION 10 FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

SEJPA shall make freely available to CONTRACTOR for examination all non-privileged directly pertinent books, documents, papers and records of SEJPA involving transactions related to this Agreement. CONTRACTOR understands that information provided to SEJPA pursuant to this

contract may become a public record and subject to disclosure pursuant to the California Public Records Act.

## SECTION 11 PREVAILING WAGE LAWS

A. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of this SECTION 12 with respect to any installation, repair, maintenance or other work constituting a public works under California Labor Code sections 1720 et seq. and 1770 et seq., and California Code of Regulations, title 8, section 16000 et seq. (collectively, "Prevailing Wage Laws").

B. CONTRACTOR must be, and must require its subcontractors to, be registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations ("DIR") pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5, prior to execution of this Agreement. No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project, or may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project, unless it registers with and pays an annual fee to the DIR. CONTRACTOR shall submit proof of current registration, and shall require subcontractors to submit proof of current registration, to SEJPA prior to commencing work on the project. For more information on how to become registered with the DIR, please go to <u>https://www.dir.ca.gov/Public-Works/Contractor-Registration.html</u>.

C. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with and require its subcontractors to comply with the requirements of Prevailing Wage Laws and any additional applicable California Labor Code provisions related to such work including without limitation payroll recordkeeping requirements. CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors shall pay not less than the prevailing rate of per diem wages as determined by the Director of the DIR for all services described in this Agreement and as required by law. The general prevailing wage determinations can be found on the DIR website at: http://www.dir.ca.gov. Copies of the prevailing rate of per diem wages may be accessed at SEJPA's administrative office, and shall be made available upon request. CONTRACTOR shall make copies of the prevailing rates of per diem wages for each craft, classification or type of worker needed to execute the services described in this Agreement available to interested parties upon request, and shall post and maintain copies at CONTRACTOR'S principal place of business and at all site(s) where services are performed. Penalties for violation of Prevailing Wage Laws may be assessed in accordance with such laws. For example, CONTRACTOR shall forfeit, as a penalty to SEJPA, Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each workman paid less than stipulated prevailing rates for services performed under this Agreement by him, or any subcontractor under him, in violation of Prevailing Wage Laws. CONTRACTOR shall defend, indemnify and hold the Indemnified Parties harmless from any claims, liabilities, costs, penalties or interest arising out of the failure or alleged failure of CONTRACTOR or its subcontractors to comply with Prevailing Wage Laws.

D. CONTRACTOR and each of its subcontractors shall keep accurate payroll records showing the name, address, social security number, work classification, straight time and overtime hours worked each day and week, and the actual per diem wages paid to each journeyman, apprentice, worker or other employee employed by CONTRACTOR or subcontractor in connection with the services performed pursuant to this Agreement. Each payroll shall be certified and available for inspection as prescribed by Labor Code section 1776. CONTRACTOR shall keep

SEJPA informed as to the location of the records and shall be responsible for the compliance with these requirements by all subcontractors. CONTRACTOR shall inform SEJPA of the location of the payroll records, including the street address, city and county and shall, within five (5) working days, provide a notice of any change of location and address. Penalties for noncompliance include a forfeiture of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) per calendar day, or portion thereof, for each worker until strict compliance is effectuated, which may be deducted from any moneys due CONTRACTOR.

E. Eight (8) hours of work shall constitute a legal day's work. CONTRACTOR and any subcontractors shall forfeit, as a penalty to SEJPA, Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) for each worker employed in the execution of services pursuant to this Agreement by CONTRACTOR or any of its subcontractors for each calendar day during which such worker is required or permitted to work more than eight (8) hours in any one (1) calendar day and forty (40) hours in any calendar week in violation of the provisions of the California Labor Code, in particular, sections 1810 to 1815, thereof, inclusive, except services performed by employees of CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors in excess of eight (8) hours per day at not less than one and one-half  $(1 \frac{1}{2})$  times the basic rate of pay, as provided in California Labor Code section 1815.

F. CONTRACTOR shall require any subcontractors performing services under this Agreement to comply with all of the above.

## SECTION 12 NOTICE

Any notices required to be given under this Agreement by either party to the other must be effected by email, or by personal delivery in writing or by mail, first class, registered or certified, postage prepaid with return receipt requested. Mailed notices must be addressed to the parties at the addresses below, but each party may change the address by giving written notice in accordance with this paragraph. Emailed notices will be deemed communicated via same-day if sent before 5:00 PST. ## SECTION 13 WORKING HOURS

All on site work is to be performed Monday through Friday between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. or as otherwise set forth in **Attachment A**. In the event these working hours conflict with an ordinance of Cardiff-by-the-Sea, CONTRACTOR shall perform site work in compliance with such ordinance. At the start of each workday CONTRACTOR will register all contract personnel on site for/or during that workday at the Operations Building. CONTRACTOR will also notify SEJPA's designated Project Manager or the Project Manager's assigned alternate of their daily schedule. Any change in the defined working times must have prior written approval from SEJPA's General Manager or his designated representative.

## SECTION 14 WARRANTY OF WORK

A. CONTRACTOR guarantees all work pursuant to this Agreement against defective materials or workmanship for period of one (1) year from the date of completion of all work, except where longer warranty periods are specifically stated. Any defective material or workmanship which may be discovered before completion all work or within one (1) year thereafter shall be corrected immediately by CONTRACTOR at its own expense notwithstanding that it may have been overlooked in previous inspections and estimates. Any work to correct a defect in workmanship and/or replacement materials shall additionally be guaranteed by CONTRACTOR for a period of one (1) year from the date of completion of such corrective work or replacement of materials.

B. Failure to inspect the work at any stage shall not relieve CONTRACTOR from any obligation to perform sound and reliable work as herein described. It is CONTRACTOR'S ultimate responsibility to complete all work as required by this Agreement.

C. During the one (1) year warranty period, should CONTRACTOR fail to remedy defective material and/or workmanship, or to make replacements within five (5) days after written notice by SEJPA, it is agreed that SEJPA may make such repairs and replacements and the actual cost of the required labor or materials shall be chargeable to and payable by CONTRACTOR.

D. The warranty provided herein shall not be in lieu of, but shall be in addition to, any warranties or other obligations otherwise imposed by this Agreement or by law. The remedies provided herein shall not be exclusive and SEJPA shall be entitled to any and all remedies provided by law.

## SECTION 15 WORK DURING DISPUTES

In the event of a dispute between the parties as to the performance of the work, the interpretation of this Agreement, or payment or nonpayment for work performed, the parties shall attempt to resolve the dispute. If the dispute is not resolved, CONTRACTOR agrees to continue the work diligently to completion and will neither rescind this Agreement nor stop the progress of the work, but may submit such controversy for determination in accordance with applicable law. In the event any litigation is commenced with respect to this Agreement, such litigation shall not serve to suspend CONTRACTOR'S obligation to continue performance of the work hereunder.

## SECTION 16 MISCELLANEOUS

A. If CONTRACTOR is required by law to be licensed and regulated by a State License Board, or any other regulatory body, CONTRACTOR hereby warrants that it has complied with any such licensing and regulatory authorities. CONTRACTOR shall provide proof of such licensure upon request by SEJPA.

B. All work performed and materials supplied in the execution of this Agreement shall comply with applicable laws, standards, codes and regulations governing such materials, items and work. All material is guaranteed to be as specified in the Scope of Work. Any alteration or deviation from the Scope of Work, which involve extra costs, may be executed by CONTRACTOR only after approval of SEJPA by written order, which will specifically state the change in the Scope of Work and the additional charges to be incurred. Unless otherwise directed by SEJPA, CONTRACTOR shall not be entitled to compensation for work requiring an approved written order if CONTRACTOR fails to obtain such an order prior to the execution of that work.

C. The "Hazard Communication Standard" requires that individuals (employees) working in an area where hazardous substances are being used must be informed of any potential dangers associated with working in that area. (29 C.F.R. § 1919.1220.) It is the responsibility of CONTRACTORS working at San Elijo Joint Powers Authority to read and acknowledge receipt of the information packet prior to the start of any scheduled work. Furthermore, CONTRACTOR shall make available all applicable information regarding hazardous substances and conditions to all CONTRACTOR employees and subcontractors.

D. CONTRACTOR will perform all work under this Agreement in good faith and in the best interests of SEJPA. CONTRACTOR shall be solely and completely responsible for the safety of all CONTRACTOR personnel, including personnel of any subcontractors, during performance of the work. In performing the work specified in this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with all laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, directives and orders, whether federal, state or local, and any and all of SEJPA policies and procedures, departmental rules and other directives applicable to the services to be performed, including, but not limited to, SEJPA's Contractor Safety Policies and Procedures. Any changes to SEJPA policies and procedures that relate to CONTRACTOR will be provided to CONTRACTOR in writing. CONTRACTOR agrees to review such policies, procedures, rules and directives the contents of which CONTRACTOR will be deemed to have knowledge.

E. If this Agreement involves an expenditure of public funds in excess of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the Agreement is subject to examination and audit of the State Auditor, at the request of SEJPA or as a part of any audit of SEJPA, for a period of three (3) years after final payment under the Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall cooperate with SEJPA regarding any such audit at no extra cost to SEJPA.

F. This Agreement represents the entire understanding of SEJPA and CONTRACTOR as to those matters contained herein. No prior oral or written understanding shall be of any force or effect with respect to those matters covered hereunder. This Agreement may not be modified or altered except in writing and signed by both parties. G. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which together shall constitute one instrument. A faxed, .pdf, or other electronic copy of the fully executed original version of this Agreement shall have the same legal effect as an executed original for all purposes. Electronic signatures shall have the same legal effect as an original signature.

H. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed inserted herein, and the Agreement shall be read and enforced as though they were included herein. If through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon the application of either party, the Agreement shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion.

I. In signing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR certifies that CONTRACTOR shall not submit a false claim in violation of the False Claims Act, section 12650 *et seq*. of the Government Code.

J. This Agreement shall be construed and enforced under and in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Venue to any action or proceeding arising out of this Agreement shall be in San Diego County, California.

K. In the event litigation or arbitration is commenced to interpret or enforce this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorney's fees in addition to costs and expenses.

L. SEJPA and CONTRACTOR do covenant that the individual executing this Agreement on their behalf is a person duly authorized and empowered to execute this Agreement for such party.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Provide direction to the recommended Phase 4 Capital Improvement Program and funding strategy;
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## BACKGROUND

In 2017, the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) commenced a phased capital improvement program to replace and upgrade wastewater and recycled water infrastructure based on findings of the 2015 Facility Plan. The value of the capital program is nearly \$49.7 million and included the following projects:

- Land Outfall Replacement (completed 2018)
- Headworks & Odor Control Improvements (completed 2019)
- Encinitas Ranch Recycled Water Expansion (completed 2019)
- SCADA and Electrical Upgrades (completed 2020)
- Water Campus Improvements (completed 2021)
- 0.6 Mega Watt PV Solar (completed 2022)
- Biosolids Dewatering Facility Improvements (est. completion 2025)

Staff bundled the projects into phases to prioritize capital spending, streamline project delivery, minimize community impacts, and reduce cost through economies of scale. The projects replaced aging infrastructure and added new facilities to ensure environmental protection, improved operational reliability and efficiency, and advanced regional climate action goals. These projects are fully funded through the 2017 Clean Water Bond Issuance, recycled water sales, capital cash contributions from agencies served by SEJPA, Caltrans, and state and federal grants. The Biosolids Dewatering Facility Improvements is the final project in Phase 3 of the Capital Program, and construction completion is scheduled for March 2025.

## **DISCUSSION**

At the February 2023 SEJPA Board meeting, staff presented an update to the agency's Capital Improvement Program. Four projects were identified for Phase 4 of the Capital Program (see Table 15-1). Each project is either at the concept or final design level and has been evaluated and prioritized by staff for construction funding consideration.

The highest ranked Phase 4 project is **Stormwater Capture & Reuse**, which will provide new source water for recycling, improve site drainage to manage runoff and erosion, protect downstream water quality, and align with industrial stormwater permit requirements. The project is estimated to cost \$2 million and has qualified for \$1.4 million in state and federal grant funding. The remaining project cost of approximately \$600,000 is proposed to be funded equally by Wastewater and Recycled Water capital cash (pay-go) in FY2023-24.

The second ranked project is **Wanket Tank Refurbishment, Pipeline**, and **RW Valve Replacement**, which will provide needed offsite recycled water storage through the refurbishment of an existing 3-million-gallon tank that will be converted from potable to recycled water storage. This project will substantially increase recycled water storage, improving service reliability, operational efficiency, and water pressure for customers. The project will also replace aging system distribution valves that are at the end of their service life. The project is estimated to cost \$3.4 million and has qualified for approximately \$1.6 million in state and federal grant funding. The remaining project cost of approximately \$1.8M is proposed to be funded by the Recycled Water capital cash (pay-go) in FY2023-24.

The next ranked Phase 4 project is **Moonlight Beach Sewer Pump Station Modifications**, which will replace aging pumps, motors, and other mechanical components to improve operational reliability, reduce maintenance intensity, and address safety concerns. The project is estimated to cost \$2 million and is being funded by the Encinitas Sanitary Sewer Division capital cash (pay-go) with the final \$0.5 million being budgeted in FY2023-24.

The final project is **Biological Treatment Improvements (NDN & CCT)**, which will implement a more robust biological process that will improve effluent quality for both ocean discharge and recycling. The improved biological treatment will optimize the disinfection process, preemptively prepares for anticipated nutrient limits on ocean outfall flows, improve tertiary filtration performance, and provide the foundational treatment for potable reuse. The project is estimated to cost \$10 million, and staff is pursuing a federal grant of \$2.5 million. Staff recommends financing the project with a private placement loan of approximately \$10 million, as the grant funding will likely be received after the project is completed. As the project provides benefits to both recycled water and wastewater programs, staff recommends that both programs fund these improvements. Staff has also identified a series of prospective near-term projects that may qualify for construction after 2025 upon further development and evaluation (see Table 15-2).

Staff plans to retain an engineering firm in 2023 to prepare a 2025 Facility Plan that will outline the capital program priorities and evaluate asset condition and replacement needs over the period of 2025 to 2035. The Facility Plan will evaluate the prospective projects identified by staff (refer to Table 15-2) as well as other projects identified through the condition assessment evaluation. Funding for the Facility Plan will be included in the FY 2023-24 budget.

## Project Delivery, Staffing Impacts, and Costs

One challenge of delivering the proposed capital projects of Phase 4, coupled with the final project of Phase 3, is the workload burden on SEJPA staff to manage the multiple contractors, design teams, and technical issues associated with complex construction. Figure 15-1 presents the anticipated timeline and aggregated cost of the Phases 3 and 4 Capital Program projects over a 3-year period. The aggregated value of the Phase 3 (Biosolids Dewatering) and four prioritized Phase 4 projects is estimated at \$28.6 million. Grant funding deadlines and project drivers require concurrent construction phases. Delivering this volume of work at multiple locations requires a strategic staffing plan. SEJPA's typical practice is to manage/administer projects with in-house staff. However, the proposed capital program (Phase 3 and 4) exceeds current staffing capacity. To deliver these five concurrent capital projects, staff estimates that additional staff resources are needed. Project support needs can be fulfilled through consultant

contracts or in-house staff. Generally, in-house staff is less expensive than utilizing consultants if the workload is full-time over multiple years. SEJPA staff will present options and seek the Board's direction for hiring in-house engineering staff or retaining consultant project management and engineering support, with a cost implication on the order of \$0.5 to \$0.9 million over the 2023-25 capital program delivery period.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact associated with staff recommendations at this time. As capital projects are advanced through planning, design, and construction, they will be presented to the Board for funding approval at each stage of development.

Staff has identified four projects with an estimated total cost of \$17.4 million that are being recommended for the SEJPA's Capital Program Phase 4, plus project delivery support costs (inhouse staff or consultant) of up to approximately \$0.9 million, for an estimated total cost of \$18.3 million. The funding strategy for these projects will likely include a combination of cash, grants, and financing.
