Board Member Barth questioned the positive coliform sample results in the recycled water effluent in the November 2013 Monthly Report. General Manager Thornton stated that the coliform issue began surfacing with the startup of the Advanced Water Treatment system, but with methodical research, investigation, and other corrective actions, no positive coliform results have occurred so far in the month of January.

Moved by Board Member Barth and seconded by Board Member Zito to:

 Approve San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Recycled Water Program – Monthly Report

Motion carried with unanimous vote of approval.

12. ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND SCHEDULE OF BOARD MEETINGS

General Manager Michael Thornton stated that in accordance with Article 3 of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) formation agreement, the SEJPA Board is required to appoint a chairperson and vice chairperson and establish the time and place for its regular meeting by the second meeting of each calendar year. The General Manager reported that the SEJPA's regular meeting schedule has been generally set as 9:00 a.m. on the second Monday of each month, with no meeting in August. The regular meetings have been held at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility, located at 2695 Manchester Avenue, Cardiff-by-the-Sea, CA 92007.

Moved by Board Member Campbell and seconded by Member Barth to:

1. Appoint Mark Muir as Chairperson and David Zito as Vice Chair for the 2014 SEJPA Board of Directors.

Motion carried with unanimous vote of approval.

At this point, Chair Muir presided over the meeting.

Moved by Member Barth and seconded by Vice Chair Zito to:

2. Establish the SEJPA regular meeting schedule for 2014 as the second Monday of each month with no planned meeting for August, with the meeting location as the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

Motion carried with unanimous vote of approval.

13. SAN ELIJO OCEAN OUTFALL 2013 ANNUAL INSPECTION REPORT

General Manager Thornton reported to the Board of Directors that the annual inspection of the ocean portion of the outfall was completed and the outfall was found to be in excellent overall condition. The inspection found no signs of spalling, rust staining, or cracking of the external surface of the outfall pipe. The General Manager also stated that 15 of the 35 pile supports, which are usually covered with sand, were exposed, allowing inspection of the zinc anodes used for corrosion protection. As a result, several anodes were found to be in need of replacement, which will be completed within budget.

Moved by Board Member Barth and seconded by Vice Chair Zito to:

1. Accept and file the San Elijo Ocean Outfall Year 2013 Annual Inspection Report prepared by Merkel & Associates, Inc.

Motion carried with unanimous vote of approval.

14. <u>PROJECT UPDATE FOR THE GENERATOR REPLACEMENT PROJECT AT THE SAN ELIJO WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY</u>

General Manager Thornton updated the Board of Directors on the generator replacement project and informed them that the recommended option for replacing the

250kW and the 500kW generators is with one 800kW unit. This option produced the lowest long-term cost to own and it provides the greatest flexibility in managing and distributing power throughout the facility. During the preparation of the Final Design, the City of Solana Beach notified the SEJPA that the emergency generator at the San Elijo Hills Pump Station, which is operated and maintained by the SEJPA, also needed to be replaced. The General Manager stated that combining the projects would save costs on common processes; therefore the Final Design of the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility and the San Elijo Hills Generator Replacement Project was completed and sent out for public bidding. Mr. Thornton informed the Board of Directors that the project budget for SEWRF is \$830,000 and \$270,000 for San Elijo Hills; and by reallocating funds from the future Headworks/Grit project, the essential emergency generator project can be completed in a timely manner. The City of Solana Beach will provide funding to the SEJPA for this project.

Moved by Vice Chair Zito and seconded by Board Member Barth to:

- 1. Authorize the \$33,000 in remaining Capital Funding from the Electrical Upgrades Project to be used for the SEWRF Generator Replacement Project; and
- 2. Authorize the use of previously budgeted Capital Funding in the amount of \$647,000 from the Headworks/Grit Chamber Rehabilitation Project to be used for the SEWRF Generator Replacement Project.

Motions carried with unanimous vote of approval.

15. PROJECT UPDATE FOR THE BIOSOLIDS CONVEYOR REPLACEMENT PROJECT AT THE SAN ELIJO WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY

General Manager Thornton reported to the Board Members that the Biosolids Conveyor, which lifts "Class B" biosolids from the belt presses into a storage hopper for loading into trucks, has been in place for 22 years and is nearing the end if its expected life cycle. The project budget to replace the conveyor system is \$493,000. The project design was recently completed and is now in the construction bidding phase. The construction contact is anticipated to be brought to the Board of Directors for approval consideration in April 2014. Funding for this project is available in the biosolid program reserve.

General Manager Thornton shared an article with the Board Members that discussed a new "beach water quality" cell phone app created by San Diego County and the conservationist group WILDCOAST. This "app" provides the public access to ocean water quality at local beaches. The article, which appeared in the San Diego Union Tribune on January 3, 2014, highlighted that the Cardiff State Beach, the location of the SEJPA Ocean Outfall, received an "A" for water quality.

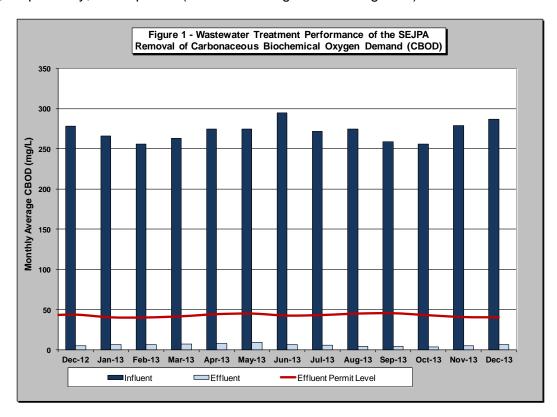

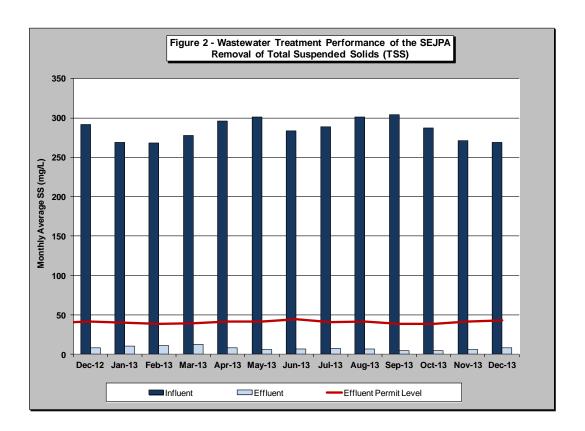

DISCUSSION

Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation

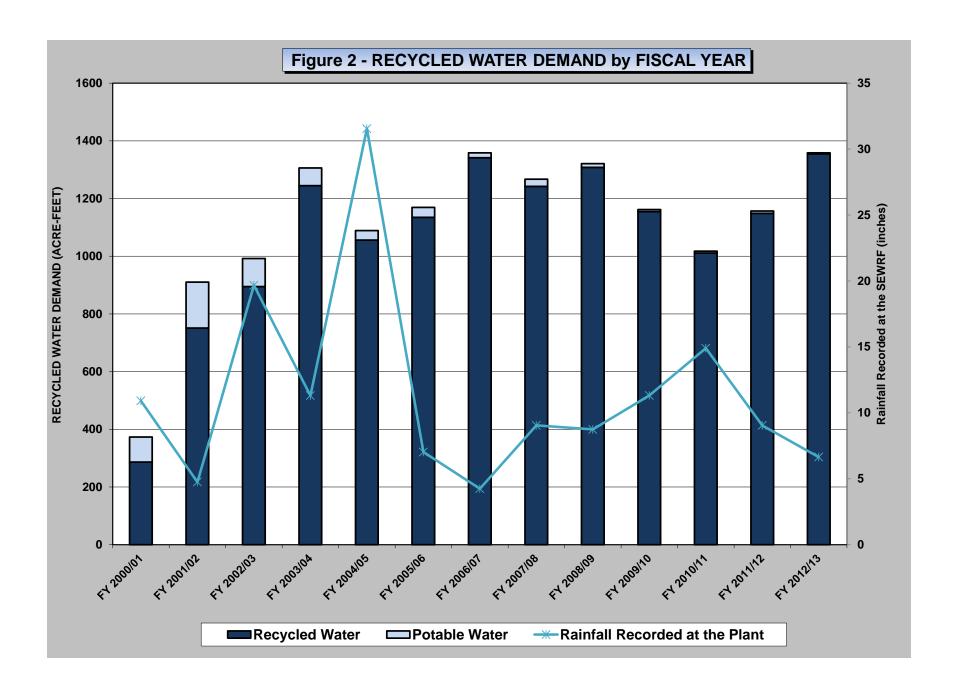
Figure 1 (attached) provides monthly supply demands for recycled water since September 2000. Figure 2 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning fourteen completed fiscal years and the current fiscal year. Figure 3 (attached) shows the December recycled water demand for each December since the program began.

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all NPDES ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of December 2013. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. Treatment levels for CBOD and TSS were 97.8 and 96.9 percent removal, respectively, in the period (as shown in Figure 1 and Figure 2).





Member Agency Flows

Presented below are the influent and effluent flows for the month of December. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was calculated for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

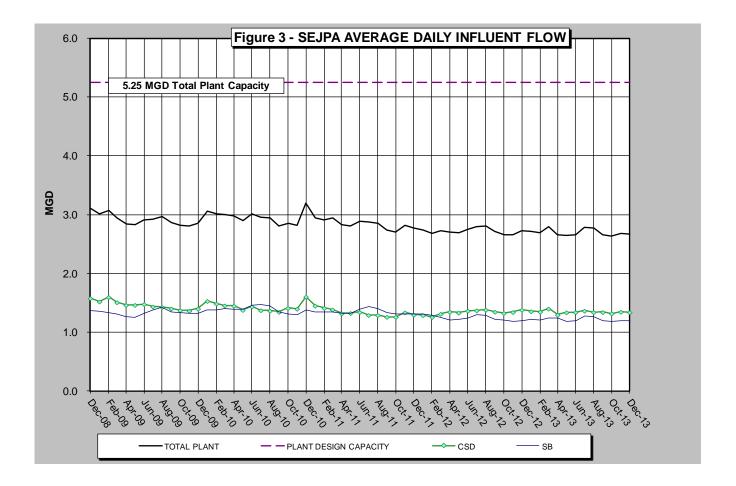

Figure 3 (below) presents the 5-year historical average daily flows per month for each Member Agency. This is to provide a historical overview of the average treated flow by each agency. As shown in the figure, the average treated flow has been approximately 2.7 million gallons per day (mgd), down from 3.0 mgd in 2008. Also shown in Figure 3 is the total wastewater treatment capacity of the plant, 5.25 mgd, of which each Member Agency has the right to 2.5 mgd, and Rancho Santa Fe Community Service District has the right to 0.25 mgd.



City of Escondido Flows

DISCUSSION

Recycled Water Production

For the month of December 2013, recycled water demand was 42.67 acre-feet (AF), which was met using 42.67 AF of recycled water and 0.00 AF of supplementation with potable water.

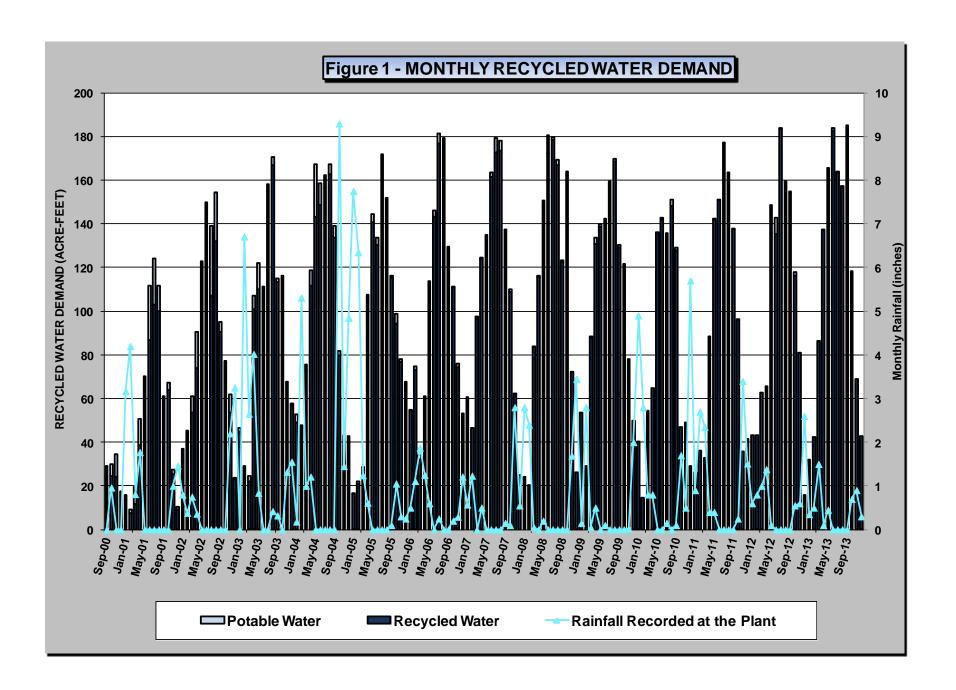
During the month, staff noted no positive coliform sample results in the recycled water effluent. These incidents began occurring intermittently during startup of the new Advanced Water Treatment system. Staff is collecting additional process samples to help identify the root cause so that it can be corrected. The Regional Water Quality Control Board, which is the permitting agency with primary responsibility for the treatment system performance has been informed of this issue and the corrective actions taken.

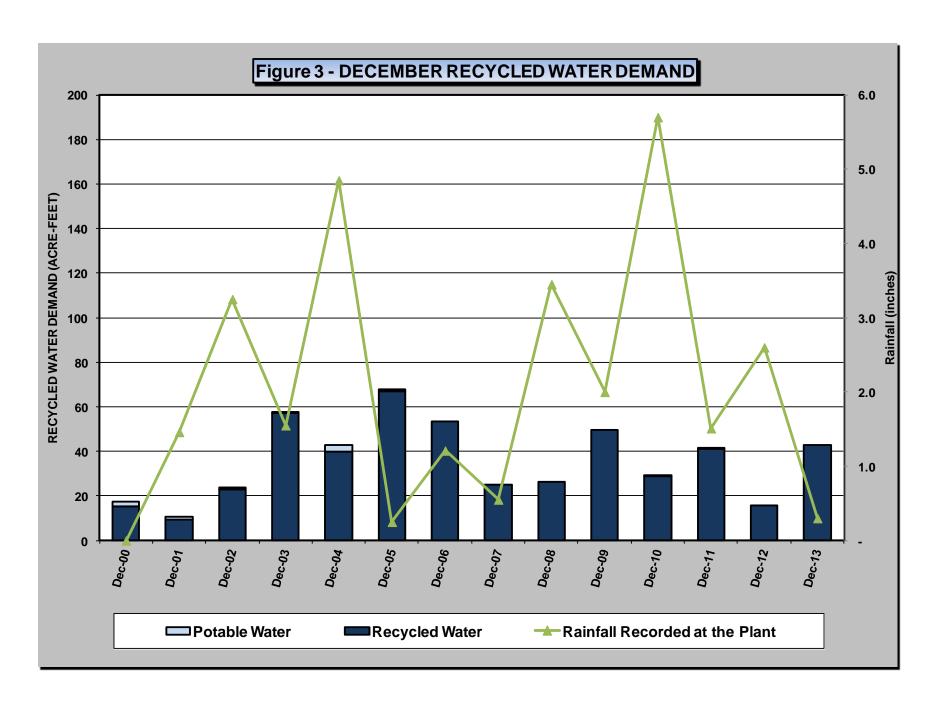

RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

The San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) owns and operates the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility (SEWRF), a recycled water utility system, and is a co-owner of the San Elijo Ocean Outfall. The SEJPA also manages several related service programs to support the cities of Encinitas and Solana Beach, as well as other local governmental agencies. The SEJPA mission statement is "To serve our communities by providing safe and reliable recycled water and wastewater services in order to protect the environment and public health."

Programs operated by the SEJPA include:

- Wastewater Treatment
- Laboratory Services
- Ocean Outfall
- Cardiff Pump Stations
- Solana Beach Pump Stations
- Encinitas Pump Stations
- Encinitas Storm Water
- Solana Beach Storm Water
- Recycled Water

The SEJPA provides wastewater treatment and disposal, water recycling, and technical support to local clean-water programs. In providing these services, the SEJPA seeks to accomplish its mission in an environmentally, socially, and fiscally responsible manner. Each of the above programs is funded by the customer base that is served and cost allocations are generally applied based on actual flows treated or level of effort provided. Operational funding collected but not spent is returned to the contributing agencies. The total operating budget for this Fiscal Year (FY 2013-14) is \$5,188,880.

DISCUSSION

The following information is an estimate of expenses for FY 2013-14, which ends June 30, 2014. Estimates are based on the best known information; accordingly, actual results may differ due to emergencies, unplanned repairs, or unforeseen events.

Below is a table of estimated costs budgeted and variance for the Fiscal Year 2013-14 by each of the SEJPA Programs:

This program is a cost center for all operations and maintenance activities for wastewater treatment at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. Activities include full secondary wastewater treatment for the cities of Encinitas and Solana Beach as well as the Rancho Santa Fe Community Services Districts, with the effluent being recycled or disposed to the ocean. Wastewater biosolids are treated and dewatered, then hauled by contractor to Arizona for beneficial reuse through land application.

Wastewater Treatment is forecasted to have budget savings of \$11,640. This is primarily due to unspent Contingency funds. Costs for Supplies and Services were higher than anticipated due to unexpected SDG&E rate increase of approximately 18%. Capital Outlay expense is expected

to exceed budget by \$24,084 as a result of unplanned repairs for the Primary Clarifiers and the Dissolved Air Floatation Thickeners. However, overall the Wastewater Treatment Program is projected to complete the year at 0.5% below budget.

The laboratory located at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility provides analytical laboratory services for the SEJPA's wastewater and recycled water programs as well as to other entities through contract agreements. For the Fiscal Year 2013-14, contract agreements include the Fairbanks Ranch Community Services District, the Rancho Santa Fe Community Services District, the Whispering Palms Community Services District, the City of Del Mar, and the City of Solana Beach.

Laboratory Services is expected to have budget savings of \$21,303 as a result of lower Personnel and Contingency expenses. Overall, the Laboratory Services Program is forecasted to complete the year at 4.8% below budget.

This program provides a cost center for all operation and maintenance services related to the ocean outfall system. These activities include effluent pump station operations and maintenance; ocean monitoring; sampling and testing; and annual outfall inspection. As the outfall capacity is shared through an agreement with the City of Escondido, all operations and maintenance costs are shared on the basis of actual usage (measured by discharged flows). Capital improvement project costs are shared based on owned capacity (79% City of Escondido and 21% SEJPA).

Ocean Outfall is expected to have a savings of \$44,917 due to lower Personnel expense offset by higher than budgeted Supplies and Services. The use of Contingency funding is not anticipated to be required. Overall, the Ocean Outfall Program is projected to complete the year at 7.2% below budget.

Under this program, the SEJPA provides pump station maintenance and operation services to the City of Encinitas, Cardiff Sanitary Division (CSD). These facilities include the Cardiff, Coast Highway, and Olivenhain pump stations. The actual costs incurred are borne solely by the CSD.

The forecasted positive variance of \$21,342 or 9.4% is primarily due to Personnel, Repairs, and Disposal Services being less than planned. Overall, the Cardiff Sanitary Division Program is forecasted to complete the year at 9.4% below budget.

Under this program, the SEJPA provides pump station maintenance and operation services to the City of Encinitas, Encinitas Sanitary Division (ESD), for the Moonlight Beach pump station. The actual costs incurred are borne solely by the ESD.

The program is forecasted to be under budget by \$9,278 due to Personnel and Contingency being less than planned. The Capital Outlay variance is due to the rebuild of a failed sewage grinder at the pump station. Overall, the Encinitas Sanitary Division Program is projected to complete the year at 7.1% below budget.

Under this program, the SEJPA provides pump station maintenance and operation services to the City of Solana Beach (SB). These facilities include the Eden Gardens, Solana Beach, San Elijo Hills, and Fletcher Cove pump stations, as well as the Storm Drain Sediment Drying & Disposal Program. The actual costs incurred are borne solely by the City of Solana Beach.

The savings anticipated under this program is due to unspent Contingency funds. This program is forecasted to complete the year at 7.4% below budget.

Recycled Water

The SEJPA owns and operates a recycled water utility which wholesales recycled water to the Santa Fe Irrigation District, the San Dieguito Water District, the City of Del Mar, and the Olivenhain Municipal Water District, as well as provide direct water sales to the Encinitas Ranch Golf Course (ERGA). SEJPA's recycled water program typically delivers between 1,100 and 1,300 acre-feet per year (AFY) of recycled water to its retail partners. Local customers that use the recycled water for landscape irrigation include the Encinitas Ranch Golf Course, Lomas Santa Executive and Country Club Golf Courses, Ecke YMCA, Del Mar Fairgrounds, local schools, parks, businesses, and street/freeway landscape. With the completion of the Advanced Water Treatment System, the facility can now produce up to 3.02 million gallons per day.

The MWD and CWA (Metropolitan Water District and San Diego County Water District respectively) revenues are incentive funding for recycled water.

The expected negative variance in Supplies and Services is primarily due to Contracted Services (\$64,000) as a result of a pipeline repair and Miscellaneous (\$28,000) due to the increase in recycled water sold, and offset by expected savings in Utilities (\$17,000), Supplies (\$27,000), and Permits/Purveyor Fees (\$10,000). The Capital Outlay expense is primarily the planned purchase of GIS mapping service and software (\$22,000).

Total Expenses

Overall, the SEJPA is anticipating a budget savings of \$71,792 as compared to planned and budgeted expenditures. Below is a summary table of the estimated current year, current year budget, and the current year variance to budget.

These savings are primarily a result of lower than forecasted Personnel Expense and Contingency offset by higher than budgeted Utility Costs as a result of higher rates, and unexpected repairs associated with recycled water pipelines and for the wastewater treatment's facility repairs.

The estimates for fiscal year end June 30, 2014 are based on the information available as of the preparation of this report; accordingly, events may occur that could alter the outcome.

RECOMMENDATION

No action required. This memorandum is submitted for information only.

BACKGROUND

To provide maximum value to the SEJPA Member Agencies and to all of the organizations served by the SEJPA, staff identified an opportunity to collaborate and share IT resources. This opportunity was pursued after the SEJPA experienced an IT server failure. The City of Encinitas provided an audit of the SEJPA IT system and found that a collaborative solution could provide unique opportunities for both organizations.

DISCUSSION

At the October 14, 2013 Board meeting, the Board of Directors approved the, "Agency Resource Sharing Agreement – IT Services with the City of Encinitas." Subsequent to the SEJPA Board approval, both organizations developed an agreement that was presented and approved by the Encinitas City Council. An implementation plan was then developed and IT equipment procured.

Phase One of the plan was successfully delivered on February 3, 2014 where the Administrative IT network was transferred from the SEJPA's antiquated server to the City of Encinitas. In addition, the SEJPA was connected to the City's fiber optic internet network and a full software update was completed on a multitude of SEJPA computers and operating programs. This success was due to the efforts by the City of Encinitas staff, Matias Labarrere, Neil O'Conner, and Jason York, and SEJPA staff Casey Larsen.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Approve Recycled Water Facility Planning Grant Resolution and Authorize General Manager to Execute; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

BACKGROUND

The San Elijo Water Pollution Control Facility and the San Elijo Ocean Outfall were originally constructed in 1965. At that time, the water pollution control facility provided primary treatment that discharged through the 4,000 foot-long ocean outfall. Since its original construction, the treatment facility has experienced many minor improvement projects and two major facility upgrades. The first major upgrade project was to meet Clean Water Act standards, which was commenced in 1989 and completed in 1991. The second major upgrade project was the construction of the recycled water treatment, storage, and distribution facilities. This project commenced in 1998 and was completed in 2000. With its completion, the facility was renamed the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. In 2013, the SEJPA completed the Advanced Water Treatment Facility to augment the recycled water treatment system and improve the water quality. The facility has a rated wastewater treatment capacity of 5.25 million gallons per day (MGD) and a recycled water treatment capacity of 3.02 MGD.

Since its initial construction, the ocean outfall has also experienced both minor and major improvements. In 1974, the ocean outfall was extended an additional 4,000 feet with the inclusion of the City of Escondido as an outfall partner. Also, about once a decade, new ballast rock is placed around the outfall pipe to support and protect the structure. The outfall has a rated discharge capacity of 25.5 MGD, it is jointly owned by the SEJPA and the City of Escondido, and the SEJPA is the managing authority of the outfall.

In 2007, the SEJPA retained Carollo Engineers to prepare a wastewater facilities master plan. The 2007 facility plan, which primarily focused on the wastewater treatment facilities, is a planning document with specific guidance and direction on asset management, facility planning, and capital improvement plan (CIP) budgeting. The plan identified short-term (5-year) capital projects that addressed immediate facility needs or projects that provided substantial process improvement or return on investment. Long-term (20-year) projects were identified for process efficiency, facility replacement needs, resource recovery opportunities, and future regulatory compliance requirements.

DISCUSSION

The proposed Facility Plan will serve as an asset management tool providing guidance for asset replacement decisions and serving as the foundation to the SEJPA's CIP program for the next 10 years. The current SEJPA CIP program was based on the 2007 Facility Master Plan, and many of the short-term projects have been constructed and some long-term projects are now required. Conducting a detailed facility review, as proposed in the 2015 Facility Plan, will provide a basis for the necessity of new capital projects and for project prioritization. Furthermore, the 2007 Facility Master Plan only considered the wastewater treatment systems. The 2015 Facility Plan proposes to include wastewater, recycled water, and ocean outfall facilities. The addition of the San Elijo Outfall is especially valuable as this infrastructure is a critical asset with limited redundant components. Some elements of the outfall are nearing 50 years of operational service and a portion of the outfall is located within the San Elijo Lagoon, which is an environmentally sensitive, Marine Conservation Area. Understanding the existing condition of the outfall, specifically the buried land portion that cannot be inspected during the annual ocean outfall inspection, is of great importance to economically maintaining the outfall in continuous service.

Best management practices recommend regularly reviewing and updating facility plans in order to incorporate changing operating conditions and strategies, to assess and address risk associated with facility failures, and to provide justification and scheduling for new capital projects. Such information is critical for operating a utility focused on the triple bottom line and providing reliable water and wastewater service.

Benefits of the Facility Plan include:

- Allows for a systematic evaluation of all potential projects at the same time.
- · Improves system reliability and reduces risks.
- Justifies capital budgets and clarifies investment decisions.
- Provides the ability to stabilize debt and consolidate projects to reduce borrowing costs.
- Focuses on preserving infrastructure while ensuring the efficient use of public funds.
- Serves as a communication tool for the Board of Directors, staff, and the public.

Facility Plan - Scope of Work

The proposed 2015 Facility Plan will include an evaluation of the facility assets, including the wastewater, recycled water, and ocean outfall systems. Elements of the Facility Plan will include condition assessment and engineering evaluation of the facilities, regulatory compliance analysis, risk assessment for facility failure, project recommendations, capital project prioritization, budgetary cost estimates, and scheduling for 2015 – 2025.

Recycled Water Facility Grant

Staff may pursue a recycled water facility planning grant to offset some of the project costs. If this pursuit is undertaken and successful, then the scope of work for the facility plan will likely expand to meet grant criteria and project needs, but ultimately should result in a lower overall project cost to the SEJPA. If the pursuit is not undertaken or is unsuccessful, then the scope of work will remain as described.

Selection of Consultant

The SEJPA has requested proposals from six engineering firms for this project. Four firms submitted proposals. The firm that represents the best combination of qualifications, project understanding and innovative or value based ideas will be selected for contract negotiations. The contract, scope of work, and fee will then be presented to the SEJPA Board for consideration at the March 2014 Board meeting.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The facility plan will focus on the assets and infrastructure of the wastewater, recycled water, and the ocean outfall systems. The cost to the SEJPA for completing the facility plan is anticipated to be in the range of \$140,000 to \$175,000, depending on the final negotiated scope of work and on possible award of grant funding. The cost of the facility plan will be funded by three SEJPA service programs (wastewater treatment, recycled water, and ocean outfall). Staff proposes to share the cost of the Facility Plan equally to the three programs unless there is clear justification to apply more cost to one program. Funding is available in each of the programs to be dedicated to this effort.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Approve Recycled Water Facility Planning Grant Resolution and Authorize General Manager to Execute; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

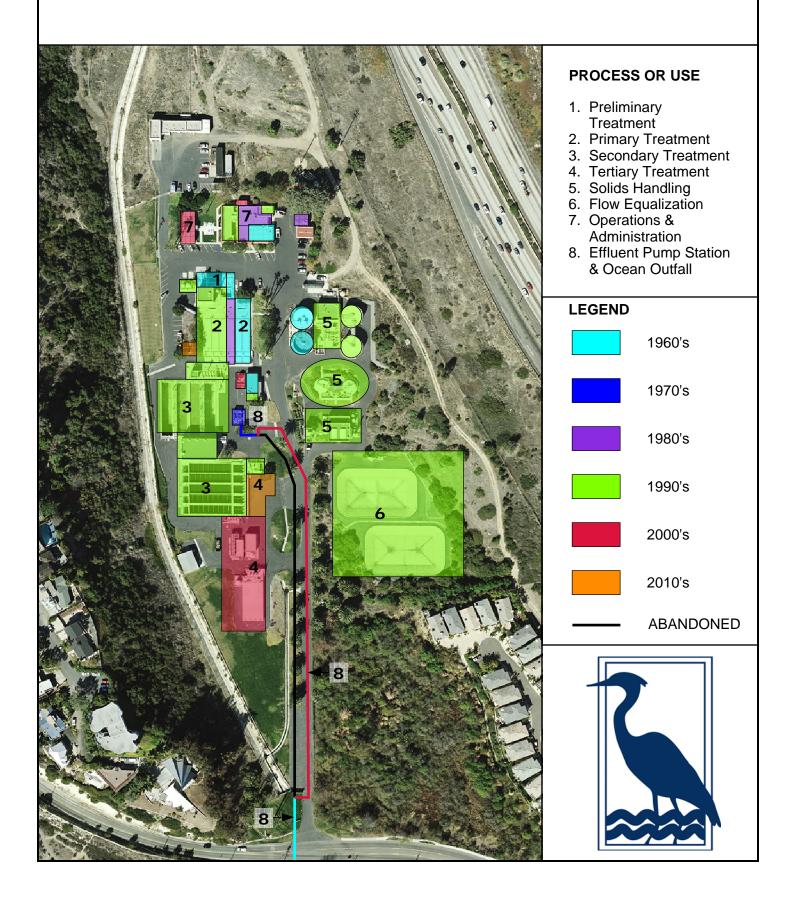

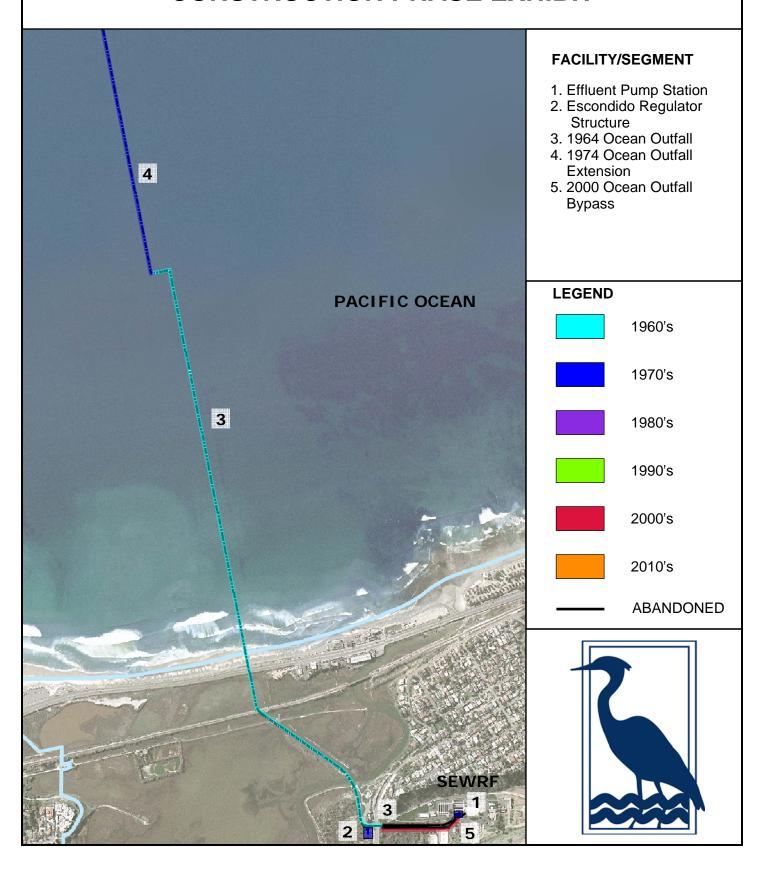
