# 13. <u>PUBLIC AGENCIES POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS TRUST PROGRAM TO PRE-FUND PENSION OBLIGATIONS AND OTHER POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS</u> (OPEB) OBLIGATIONS

Paul Kinkel, Director of Finance and Administration, stated that at the June 2018 Board meeting, staff provided information on the IRS Section 115 trust (Trust). The Trust is an irrevocable locally controlled trust that is dedicated to either pension expense or OPEB expense. The Trust provides investment flexibility, control over the contribution rate from the Trust to UAL, and easier access to investment performance. Mr. Kinkel introduced Rachael Sanders from Public Agency Retirement Services, who briefly explained the benefits and costs of creating and maintaining a Trust. Next, Christiane Tsuda from Highmark Capital Management presented the various investment options available in the Trust. Mr. Kinkel stated that funding an irrevocable trust would provide restricted funds that may be used at the Board's discretion to smooth the pension expense that can fluctuate due to changes in investment market conditions and CalPERS policies, in addition to making additional contributions to reduce the UAL.

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2019-01, Resolution of the Governing Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Approving the Adoption of the Public Agencies Post-Employment Benefits Trust Administered by Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS).

# 14. <u>AWARD CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES DURING CONSTRUCTION FOR THE ENCINITAS RANCH RECYCLED WATER EXPANSION PROJECT</u>

The General Manager gave a brief background of the Encinitas Ranch Recycled Water Expansion project. The project includes approximately 7,000 linear feet of new pipeline and a small booster pump station. This project will service agricultural, HOA green belts and open space, and city trails. It is anticipated to offset approximately 45 acre-feet per year, or roughly 14.6 million gallons annually, of potable water consumption. The Requeza Street work is subject to the commitment of the HOA's to convert to recycled water. Five construction bids were received and reviewed by the engineer of record, Dudek. Based on the review of the lowest base bid, staff recommended award of the project to Burtech Pipeline. In addition, staff issued a Request for Bids for prepurchasing the package equipment system for the booster pump station; staff recommended award of the equipment to Hidden Valley Pump. Mr. Thornton then stated that the project will require support from the engineer of record, Dudek, during construction and additional inspection services from Black & Veatch.

The SEJPA has adequate funding in its capital program for the project using funds available from the 2017 Clean Water Bond. The project will receive \$150,000 in infrastructure cost sharing from the end users. Also, upon successful completion of the project, grant funding of \$525,000 will be received from the California Proposition 84, Integrated Regional Water Management grant program.

Moved by Board Member Mosca and seconded by Chair Boerner Horvath to:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to award the base bid construction contract to Burtech Pipeline for an amount of \$1,225,000;
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to award the Schedule B Optional bid for an amount up to \$343,000 subject to the General Manager's discretion after discussion with HOA;
- 3. Authorize the General Manager to award the Pumping System equipment to Hidden Valley Pump for an amount of \$73,000;
- 4. Authorize the General Manager to amend the professional services agreement with Dudek for engineering services during construction for an amount of \$55,520;
- 5. Authorize the General Manager to amend the professional services agreement with Black and Veatch to increase project inspection for an amount of \$41,393; and
- 6. Authorize the General Manager to enter into agreement with the Encinitas Ranch Community Association and San Dieguito Water District for recycled water service and infrastructure cost sharing.

# 15. <u>PROGRESS UPDATE – ALTERNATIVE DELIVERY FOR THE BUILDING AND SITE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT</u>

General Manager Thornton stated that at the June 2018 Board meeting, staff was authorized to develop the Building and Site Improvements project using the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Construction Management at Risk (CMAR) delivery method. SEJPA is currently seeking qualifications from construction firms that are experienced with the type of work proposed and the CMAR delivery method. Mr. Thornton discussed the advantages as well as disadvantages of the CMAR delivery method. The request for qualifications is the first step in a two-step procurement process. Final selection criteria will be based on best value provided to SEJPA and will include qualifications, experience and method of approach in addition to price and other non-price related criteria. SEJPA is also considering utilizing a lease-purchase financing approach for the project pursuant to Government Code section 6584, et seq., which would provide value added flexibility and efficiencies to the project.

#### 16. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

General Manager Thornton informed the Board of Directors that under the new NPDES permit issued in June, the SEJPA must comply with additional requirements including a plume tracking study. Staff contacted other agencies and proposed collaboration on this new task. Mr. Thornton stated that under the SEJPA's biosolids program, an outside laboratory that performs services for the SEJPA, diluted a sample, which subsequently raised our detection levels and caused the Environmental Protection Agency to issue a letter of warning. Staff has contacted the outside laboratory to determine the reasoning behind the action. The General Manager informed the Board Members that the recycled water system continues to get intermittent low levels of coliform. Staff is actively working with outside consultants on this issue. The General Manager stated that the APCD issued Notices of Violation which state that several pump stations are being operated without authority from the Air Pollution Control Officer. Staff is in discussions with APCD management to obtain clarity. Finally, the General Manager informed the Board about an emergency repair of the digester gas pipeline at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

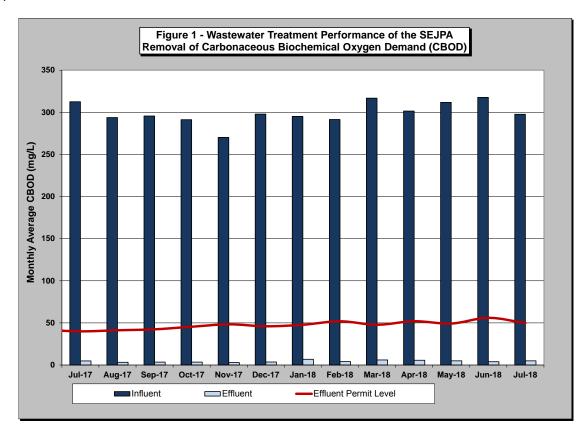

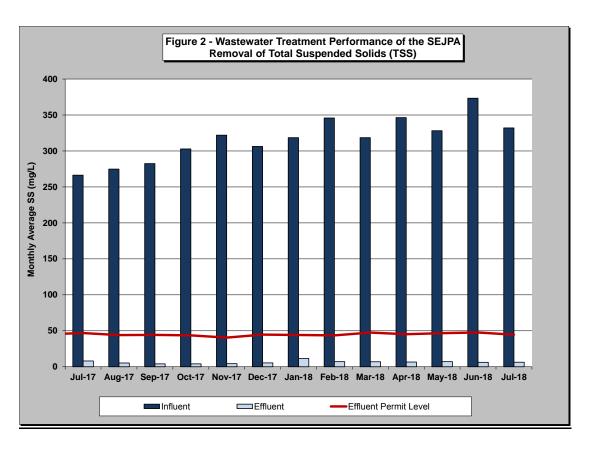

#### **DISCUSSION**

#### Monthly Treatment Plant Performance and Evaluation

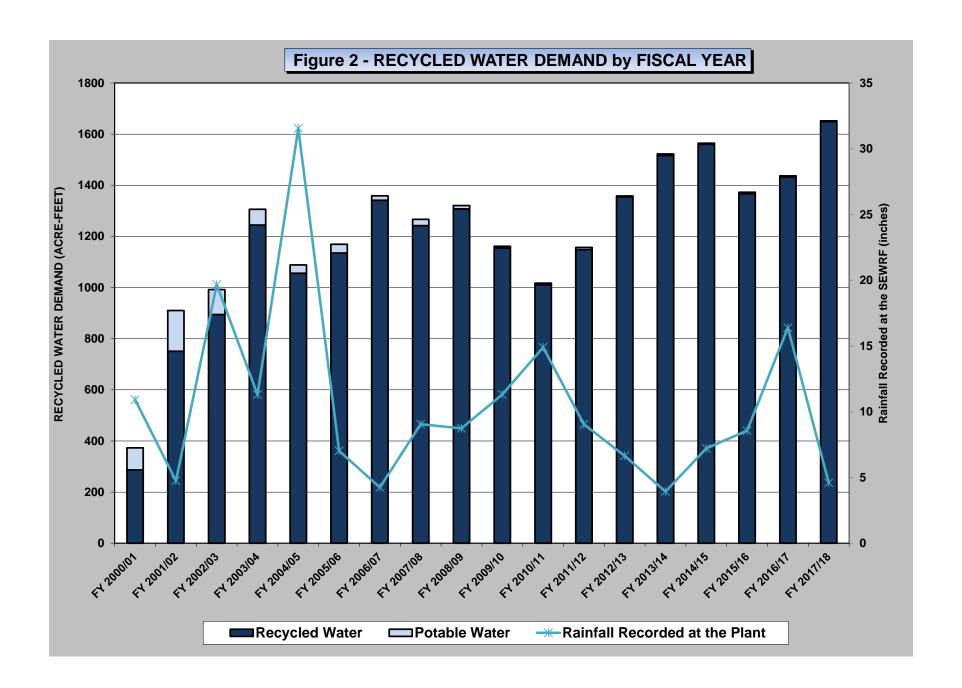
Figure 1 (attached) provides monthly demands for recycled water since deliveries began in September 2000. Figure 2 (attached) provides a graphical view of annual recycled water demand spanning the last 17 fiscal years. Figure 3 (attached) shows the monthly recycled water demand for each July since the program began. Figure 4 (attached) compares budget versus actual recycled water sales for FY 2018-19; showing sales are starting the year above budget.

Wastewater treatment for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) met all National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) ocean effluent limitation requirements for the month of July 2018. The primary indicators of treatment performance include the removal of Carbonaceous Biochemical Oxygen Demand (CBOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS). The SEJPA is required to remove a minimum of 85 percent of the CBOD and TSS from the wastewater. Treatment levels for CBOD and TSS were 98.4 and 98.1 percent removal, respectively, (as shown in Figure 1 and Figure 2).





#### Member Agency Flows

Presented below are the influent and effluent flows for the month of July. Average daily influent flows were recorded for each Member Agency. Total effluent flow was calculated for the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. The SEJPA commenced wastewater treatment services for the City of Del Mar on March 29, 2018.

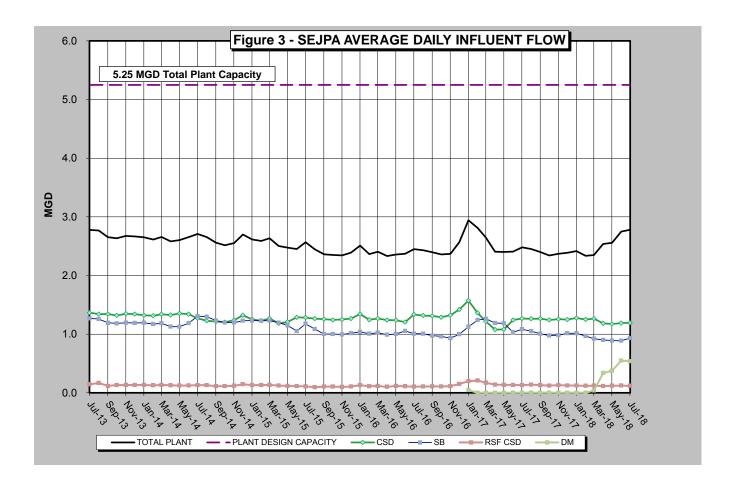

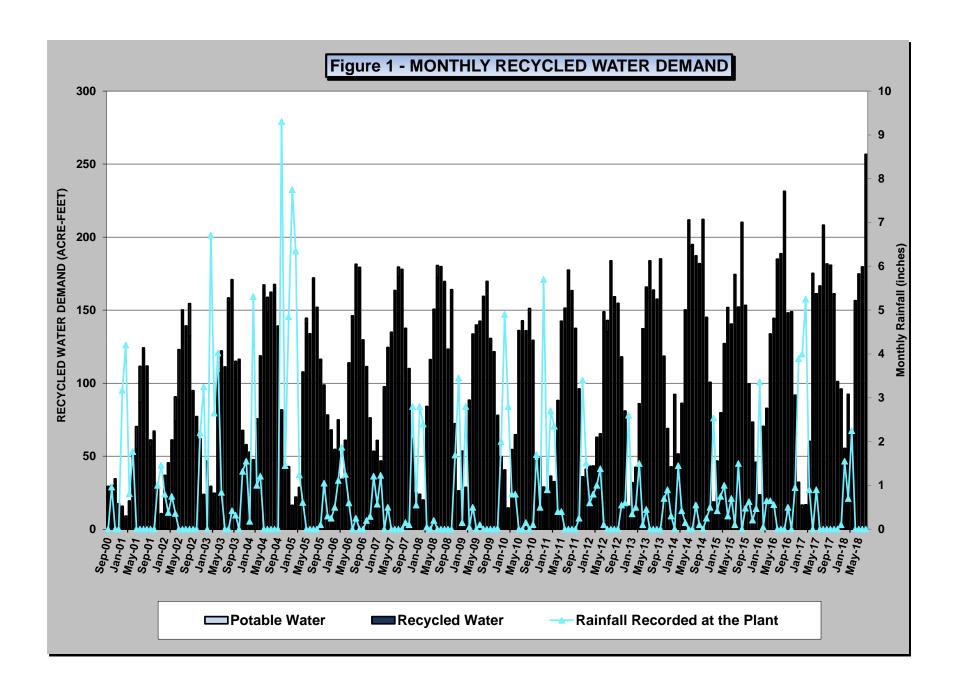
July was a record month for recycled water production and delivery, exceeding budget expecations by 47 AF or by more than 22 percent.

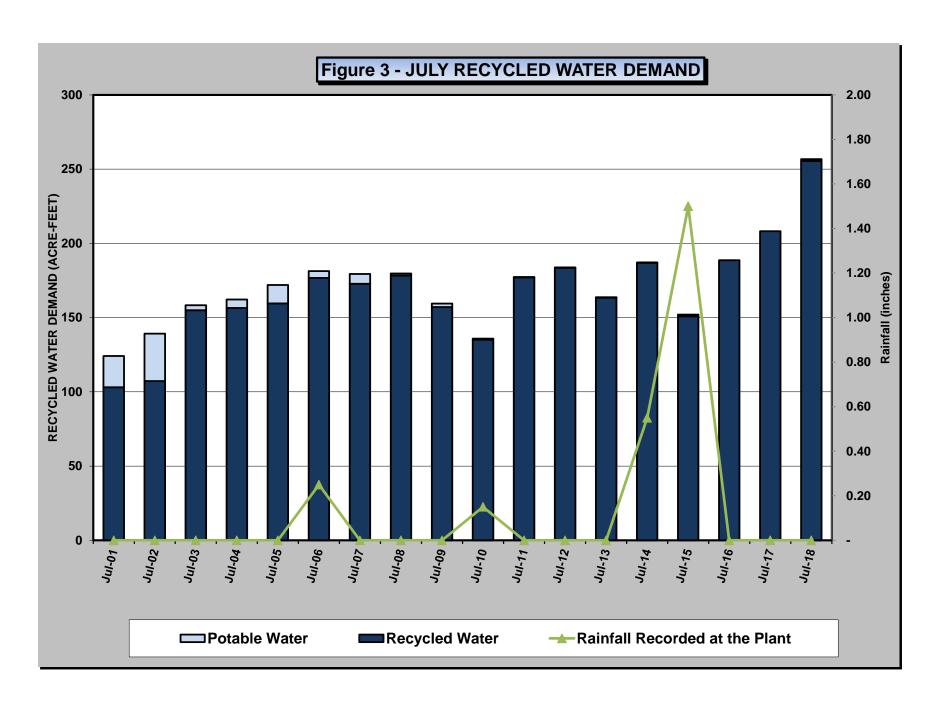

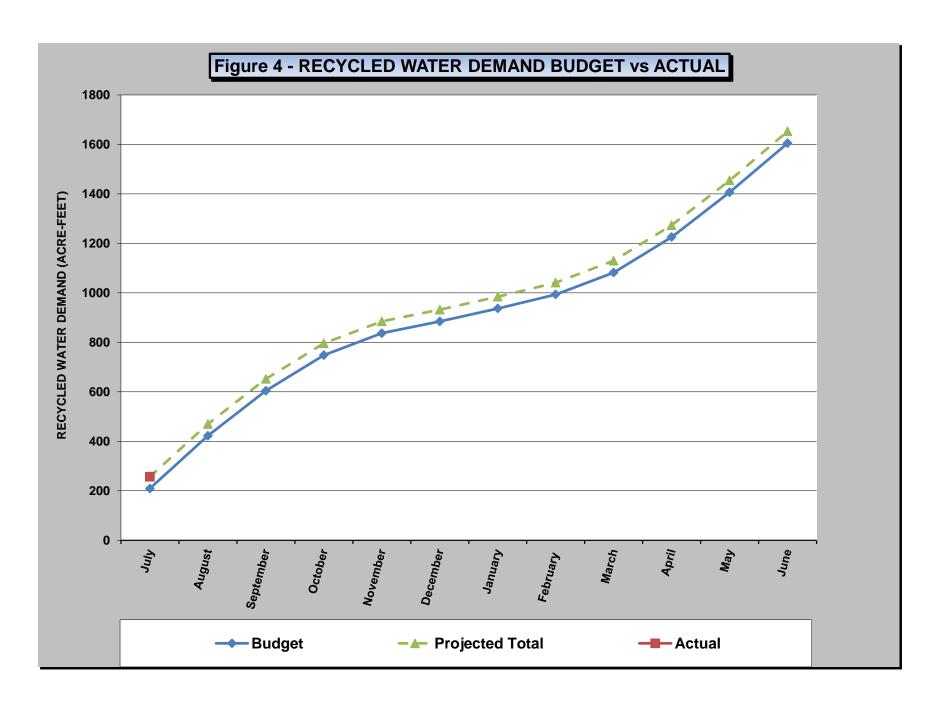

CONSULTING, INC. FOR COMMUNICATIONS AND OUTREACH SUPPORT

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a professional service agreement with Water Systems Consulting, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$49,385; and

2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) operates wastewater, recycled water, and capital programs that require effective communication and outreach to the communities it serves. The SEJPA capital program has several projects that require community notifications and public outreach. The recently adopted NPDES ocean discharge permit places increased responsibility on the SEJPA for communicating limits on prescription drugs, plastics, personal care products, and other flushable items that may not be fully eliminated by the treatment process and therefore have a potential to harm the ocean and aquatic life.

#### DISCUSSION

SEJPA seeks assistance with community notifications and public outreach for its operational and capital programs. The recently awarded construction contract for the expansion of recycled water pipelines within the City of Encinitas has requirements for project communications with the impacted residents and businesses. The currently planned Building and Site Improvement Project also could benefit from continued public outreach as the project progresses through final design and permitting. Also, the SEJPA's wastewater, recycled water, and ocean outfall programs have both permit responsibilities and opportunistic benefits to be derived from a timely and effective communication and outreach plan.

The SEJPA has worked with Water Systems Consulting (WSC) for outreach support on the Land Outfall Replacement Project and for website content support. The work produced was

creative, timely, and tailored to SEJPA's needs. WSC demonstrated the ability to conceptualize and develop effective messaging for construction challenges encountered with the Land Outfall Replacement Project. Furthermore, WSC is currently working with the Central Coast Blue project supporting five communities with recycled water outreach and strategic planning. The collaborative and consensus building approach demonstrated by WSC for the Central Coast Blue project is expected to have direct and transferable benefits to the SEJPA efforts.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

The recommended agreement with WSC is for an amount not to exceed \$49,385. Of this amount, Olivenhain Municipal Water District will fund approximately \$8,800 through a cost sharing agreement for joint recycled water outreach. Therefore, the net cost to the SEJPA will be for an amount not to exceed \$40,585. Adequate funds are available for this agreement in the FY 2018-19 Budget.

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a professional services agreement with Water Systems Consulting, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$49,385; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

UPDATE OF APPENDIX A BY RESOLUTION 2019-02

#### **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- Adopt Resolution 2019-02 entitled, "A Resolution of the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Amending Board Resolution No. 2010-05 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code"; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

#### BACKGROUND

The Political Reform Act of 1974, Government Code §§ 81000, et seq. (the Act), requires public officials to disclose assets, income and other financial interests that could be materially affected by the decisions they make or participate in making (Govt. Code §§ 87300 et seq.). The Act also requires, in appropriate circumstances, that public officials be disqualified from acting when necessary to avoid conflicts of interest (Govt. Code § 87100). Certain public officials, including elected officials, are required to disclose all financial interests (Govt. Code § 87200). Other public officials, including agency employees, are required to disclose in accordance with their agency's conflict-of-interest code (Govt. Code § 87300). Each agency is required to develop its own conflict-of-interest code to identify the types of financial interests that might be affected by the agency's decisions and the positions that make or participate in making those decisions. (Govt. Code §§ 87300-87313).

The Act requires every state agency to review its conflict-of-interest code biennially to determine whether the code accurately reflects the current organization of the agency and the job duties of the various positions listed in the code (Govt. Code § 87306). In its most recent biennial review, SEJPA staff identified the need for the proposed amendments to include additional SEJPA staff and consultants. (See Attachment 1).

Once approved by the Board, the conflict-of-interest code amendment will be filed with the San Diego County Clerk's office.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The SEJPA last amended its conflict-of-interest code in 2010, following organizational changes. Since then, the SEJPA has reorganized its staff responsibilities, and FPPC has amended its regulations to allow electronic filing for those officials required to file their Form 700 with FPPC. To reflect these changes and comply with the requirements of Government Code § 87306, staff developed the proposed amendment.

This amendment will be adopted pursuant to Public Resources Code § 31102, which states that the SEJPA shall adopt its own regulations; and pursuant to Government Code § 87306, which states that each agency shall amend its conflict-of-interest code when change is necessitated by relevant changes in the duties assigned to existing positions within the agency.

Government Code § 87302(a) requires that every conflict-of-interest code contain specific enumeration of the positions within the agency which involve the making or participation in the making of decisions which may foreseeably have a material effect on any financial interest and, for each enumerated position, the specific types of investments, business positions, interests in real property, and sources of income which are reportable. This amendment would bring the SEJPA's conflict-of-interest code into compliance with these sections of the Government Code, and allow these individuals to take advantage of new electronic filing options offered by the FPPC.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT

Apart from the administrative costs of preparing and obtaining approvals for the amendment, this amendment will not impose any costs on the SEJPA.

Upon adoption, this revised attachment to the code will be filed with the County Clerk's office.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- Adopt Resolution 2019-02 entitled, "A Resolution of the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority Amending Board Resolution No. 2010-05 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code"; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

WHEREAS, on December 12, 1996, by Board Resolution No. 96-6, the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority amended SEJPA Board Resolution No. 89-5 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code; and

WHEREAS, on December 14, 2000, by Board Resolution No. 2000-08, the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority amended SEJPA Board Resolution No. 96-6 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code; and

WHEREAS, on September 11, 2006, by Board Resolution No. 2006-06, the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority amended SEJPA Board Resolution No. 2000-08 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code; and

WHEREAS, on February 8, 2010, by Board Resolution No. 2010-05, the Board of Directors of the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority amended SEJPA Board Resolution No. 2006-06 Changing Appendix A Regarding Designated Employees and Disclosure Categories with Respect to Filings Under the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code; and

WHEREAS, it is now appropriate to amend Appendix A to said Conflict of Interest Code to update the provisions regarding designated employees and their disclosure categories; and

WHEREAS, the Standard Form Conflict of Interest Code promulgated by the Fair Political Practices Commission, as amended by the Commission from time to time, will remain as the Conflict of Interest Code for the SEJPA:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The attachment to this Resolution is hereby adopted as amended Appendix A to the SEJPA's Conflict of Interest Code.

### SAN ELIJO JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE

The Political Reform Act of 1974 (Government Code Sections 81000 et. seq.) requires local government agencies to adopt and promulgate conflict of interest codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 Cal. Code of Regs. Section 18730) that contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code and may be incorporated by reference in an agency's code. After public notice and hearing, the standard code may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act.

Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendix designating positions and establishing disclosure requirements shall constitute the Conflict of Interest Code for the San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (the "Agency").

Individuals holding designated positions and non-designated positions identified in Government Code section 87200 shall file their statements of economic interests with the Agency's Clerk of the Board, who will make the statements available for public inspection and reproduction (Gov. Code section 81008). The Agency will retain all such statements for individuals in designated positions. The Agency will retain copies of all such statements for individuals in non-designated positions and will forward the originals to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of San Diego County (Gov. Code section 87500(k)).

#### **APPENDIX A**

#### **Disclosure Categories**

Individuals holding designated positions must report their interests according to the following disclosure category(ies) to which their position has been assigned.

#### Category 1: All Sources

Interests in real property (not including primary residence) located within the Agency Service Area (ASA) or within two miles of the ASA; and investments and business positions in business entities, and income, including loans, gifts, and travel payments from all sources.

#### Category 2: Agency Specific

Interests in real property (not including primary residence) located within the ASA or within two miles of the ASA; investments and business positions in business entities doing business with the ASA and/or located in San Diego County; and income, including but not limited to loans, gifts, and travel payments, from sources in San Diego County, and/or from sources outside the County whose economic position may be affected by decisions or recommendations made by the agency at all levels.

#### Category 3: Department Specific

Interests in real property (not including primary residence) located within the ASA or within two miles of the ASA; investments and business positions in business entities located in San Diego County; and income, including loans, gifts, and travel payments from sources whose economic position may be affected by the decisions or recommendations made by the department to which the filer is assigned duties.

#### Category 4: Property/Facilities Entitlement

Interests in real property (not including primary residence) located within the ASA or within two miles of the ASA; investments and business positions in business entities located in San Diego County; and income, including loans, gifts, and travel payments from sources that are of the type to request an entitlement to use agency property or facilities, including, but not limited to: a license; a facilities use permit; or a vendor permit.

#### Category 5: Consultant Specific

Where the broadest disclosure is not necessary, the agency may set an interim disclosure that is more tailored to consulting positions with a limited range of duties.

As used herein, "Agency Service Area" is defined as the jurisdictional boundaries of the Agency's member agencies and those areas served by the Agency's wastewater and recycled water services.

## RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Provide guidance to the General Manager for the completion of a Classification and Compensation Study; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## **BACKGROUND**

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) employees are currently operating under a 3-year labor agreement (Resolution No. 2018-02), which is scheduled to expire June 30, 2019. As part of the resolution, the Competitiveness Assessment Decision section states, "The SEJPA will perform a Classification and Compensation Study and present recommendations to the SEJPA Board of Directors prior to the end of this contract."

## **DISCUSSION**

In most instances, employers utilize a systematic way to assess and compensate employees. Classification and compensation structures are developed partly in response to state labor laws and also to attract and retain qualified staff. Job classifications define job duties, responsibilities, and the parameters by which duties are to be performed. Ideally, pay assigned to each classification is based on comparisons with the labor market and the value of the job with respect to other positions within the agency.

A study of the current labor market can provide information to determine whether the agency's pay structure is appropriate or if adjustments should be considered.

Prior SEJPA pay structures have been based on surveys of cities and agencies where consideration was given to:

- Organizational type and structure
- · Similarity of the population served, staff and operational budgets
- Type of services provided
- Local labor market and geographic location

These agencies are listed below in Table 1:

SEJPA has the option of completing the Classification and Compensation study in-house or through the use of a consultant. The cost to have a consultant prepare a Classification and Compensation study is estimated to be between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

There is no external cost to having the study completed in-house, and this effort could be executed under the direction of the General Manager.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact associated with this staff report.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Provide guidance to the General Manager for the completion of a Classification and Compensation Study; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a contract in the amount of \$560,000 with Tesco Controls, Inc., for the 2018 SCADA Upgrade Project;
- 2. Authorize the General Manager to amend the professional services agreement with Carollo Engineers, Inc., for Construction Management during project construction for an amount of \$42,000; and
- 3. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## BACKGROUND

San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) uses a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system to monitor and control water treatment, distribution, and storage processes. The SCADA system is comprised of computer hardware and software, which communicate by fiber optics, private cellular network, and wireless radio links to convey information, alarms, and operational direction. The system allows staff to monitor facility operations and process performance in real-time, either onsite or remotely. Treatment Operators utilize SCADA to adjust pump speeds; open and close valves; monitor flows, tank levels, and pump discharge pressures; and observe water quality measurements 24 hours a day. The SCADA system provides for reliable and efficient operation of treatment and conveyance systems.

## DISCUSSION

In November 2017, the Board authorized the General Manager to enter into an agreement with Carollo Engineers to provide engineering services for the SCADA Upgrade project to develop technical specifications and other documents necessary to publicly bid the SCADA project contract. Carollo prepared a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to assist the SEJPA in identifying qualified firms to propose on the project. The RFQ was advertised on March 28,

2018 and six prospective bidders reviewed the RFQ on Planet Bids, of which three submitted RFQ packages to the SEJPA on April 17, 2018. The RFQ packages were reviewed by Carollo and it was determined that only two of the prospective bidders met the experience/certification requirement for the project. Bid documents for the project were sent to the two qualified bidders and bids were opened publicly on August 23, 2018. The results of the bidding are as follows:

Company	Bid Price
Tesco Controls, Inc.	\$560,000
Technical Systems, Inc.	\$845,000

The bids were reviewed by Carollo Engineers and determined to be complete and in compliance with all bidding requirements (Attachment 1).

The main elements of the project include new hardware, software, programming, equipment installation, system testing and commissioning, warranty, training and support services. Hardware includes servers, data historians, monitors, programmable logic controllers, and equipment panels. SCADA software includes Wonderware System Platform, Historian, Galaxy, VMWare, and Windows Server operating system licenses to replace 11 workstations with remote terminals. Programming, hardware/software, and equipment installation will be performed at six functional areas within the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility and at five wastewater pump stations located within the cities of Encinitas and Solana Beach. Cybersecurity enhancements will include developing a system program and written plan to follow the guidelines, requirements, and standards outlined in the latest version of the NIST Cybersecurity Framework and provide a comprehensive cybersecurity plan to help identify, protect, detect, respond, and recover from cyber threats.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

The lowest responsive/responsible bid for the project is \$560,000 from Tesco Controls, Inc. (Attachment 2). The design engineer (Carollo) is already under contract for engineering support during construction in the amount of \$21,200. Staff also negotiated a fee of \$42,000 with Carollo to provide Construction Management, including inspection and quality control, during the construction of the project (Attachment 3). Therefore, the total amount for construction management and engineering during construction is \$63,200. Staff also recommends including a contingency fund of \$62,320 (10% of project costs) to address potential unforeseen conditions that may be encountered during construction. The estimated cost to complete, based on current information, is \$685,520. The budgetary cost estimate for the project was \$838,000.

- 2. Authorize the General Manager to amend the professional services agreement with Carollo Engineers, Inc., for Construction Management during project construction for an amount of \$42,000; and
- 3. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

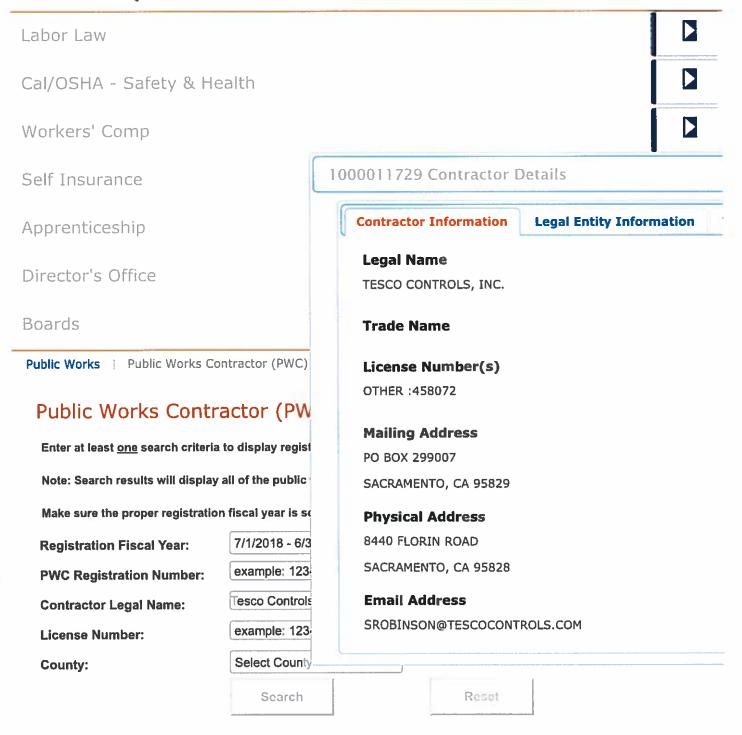

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES FOR DEVELOPING BIKE/PEDESTRIAN PATH

## **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a professional service agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for an amount not to exceed \$450,000; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## **BACKGROUND**

The San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) is working with Caltrans and the City of Encinitas to construct a bike and pedestrian path (project) through SEJPA property, which will improve bike and walking routes within the community of Cardiff by the Sea. The proposed project is to connect with other bike/pedestrian paths as part of regional transportation planning. The path through SEJPA property is included in the published Caltrans Public Works Plan (Final: June 2014; as amended December 2016) and has received positive support from both California Coastal Commission staff and the community. The conceptual design of the project has been completed and it has undergone initial permit review by the City of Encinitas, however additional environmental clearance remains as part of the final design.

## **DISCUSSION**

SEJPA and Caltrans have agreed to select Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. to serve as the lead engineering firm for the project. In addition, SEJPA and Caltrans have agreed on the scope of work and fee for preparing the final design and environmental permitting. The fee for this effort is \$450,000 (Attachment 1).

In June 2018, the SEJPA Board authorized the General Manager to engage Kimley-Horn and Associates to begin final design and environmental permitting for an amount up to \$100,000.

This funding was to keep progress continuing, while the SEJPA and Caltrans prepared the necessary cost sharing agreement.

Since then, SEJPA and Caltrans reached agreement on this contribution agreement for engineering and environmental services. The contribution agreement (Attachment 2) states that Caltrans will reimburse the SEJPA up to \$450,000 for final design engineering and environmental permitting, based on actual costs incurred. This work is to be completed by January 1, 2021.

Therefore, it is staff's recommendation to fully fund the engineering and environmental service agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for an amount not to exceed \$450,000. Based on the current project progress, the design and permitting effort is expected to be completed in 2019.

## FINANCIAL IMPACT

The total financial impact of the requested Board action is \$450,000, which includes the initial funding authorization (\$100,000) in June 2018. SEJPA has adequate funding available within the Building and Site Improvement capital project. Reimbursement funds from Caltrans are expected to total \$450,000 and be received in FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20.

It is recommended that the Board of Directors:

- 1. Authorize the General Manager to execute a professional service agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for an amount not to exceed \$450,000; and
- 2. Discuss and take action as appropriate.

## **Project Understanding**

It is our understanding that SEJPA and Caltrans intend to enter into a contribution agreement for the preparation of construction documents for the improvements identified in detail below, including project permitting through various agencies. Under such an agreement, Kimley-Horn would contract directly with SEJPA and Caltrans would contribute funds under said agreement for the Consultant services specified herein.

The project includes: roadway and shared-use trail crossing improvements within Manchester Avenue along the frontage of the SEWRF located at 2965 Manchester Avenue in Cardiff, California and necessary transitions to existing roadway improvements east and west of SEWRF's frontage; reinforced concrete box and/or rectangular channel improvements to convey the 100-year return-frequency storm through the SEWRF property, including attenuation of peak flow volumes, if feasible; and, a lighted improved shared-use trail west and north of existing and future SEWRF operational areas, including grading, security fencing, drainage and storm water quality improvements, and connections/transitions to trail improvements at Manchester Avenue and to Class 1 bikeway improvements within Interstate-5 at the northeast corner of the SEWRF property.

#### KIMLEY-HORN AND ASSOCIATES, INC.

#### STANDARD PROVISIONS

- (1) Consultant's Scope of Services and Additional Services. The Consultant's undertaking to perform professional services extends only to the services specifically described in this Agreement. However, if requested by the Client and agreed to by the Consultant, the Consultant will perform Additional Services, which shall be governed by these provisions. Unless otherwise agreed to in writing, the Client shall pay the Consultant for any Additional Services an amount based upon the Consultant's then-current hourly rates plus an amount to cover certain direct expenses including telecommunications, in-house reproduction, postage, supplies, project related computer time, and local mileage. Other direct expenses will be billed at 1.10 times cost.
- (2) Client's Responsibilities. In addition to other responsibilities described herein or imposed by law, the Client shall:
- (a) Designate in writing a person to act as its representative with respect to this Agreement, such person having complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, and make or interpret the Client's decisions.
- (b) Provide all information and criteria as to the Client's requirements, objectives, and expectations for the project including all numerical criteria that are to be met and all standards of development, design, or construction.
- (c) Provide to the Consultant all previous studies, plans, or other documents pertaining to the project and all new data reasonably necessary in the Consultant's opinion, such as site survey and engineering data, environmental impact assessments or statements, upon all of which the Consultant may rely.
- (d) Arrange for access to the site and other private or public property as required for the Consultant to provide its services.
- (e) Review all documents or oral reports presented by the Consultant and render in writing decisions pertaining thereto within a reasonable time so as not to delay the services of the Consultant.
- (f) Furnish approvals and permits from governmental authorities having jurisdiction over the project and approvals and consents from other parties as may be necessary for completion of the Consultant's services.
- (g) Cause to be provided such independent accounting, legal, insurance, cost estimating and overall feasibility services as the Client may require.
- (h) Give prompt written notice to the Consultant whenever the Client becomes aware of any development that affects the scope, timing, or payment of the Consultant's services or any defect or noncompliance in any aspect of the project.
- (i) Bear all costs incidental to the responsibilities of the Client.
- (3) **Period of Services.** Unless otherwise stated herein, the Consultant will begin work timely after receipt of a properly executed copy of this Agreement and any required retainer amount. This Agreement is made in anticipation of conditions permitting continuous and orderly progress through completion of the services. Times for performance shall be extended as necessary for delays or suspensions due to circumstances that the Consultant does not control. If such delay or suspension extends for more than six months (cumulatively), Consultant's compensation shall be renegotiated.
- (4) **Method of Payment.** Compensation shall be paid to the Consultant in accordance with the following provisions:
- (a) Invoices will be submitted periodically for services performed and expenses incurred. Invoices are due and payable upon presentation. Client shall pay Consultant a time-price differential of one and one-half percent (1.5%) of the outstanding amount of each invoice that is overdue for more than 30 days. The Client shall also pay any applicable sales tax. All retainers will be held by the Consultant for the duration of the project and applied against the final invoice. If the Client fails to make any payment due to the Consultant under this or any other agreement within 30 days after presentation, the Consultant may, after giving notice to the Client, suspend services and withhold deliverables until all amounts due are paid in full and may commence proceedings, including recording liens, to secure its right to payment under this Agreement.
- (b) If the Client relies on payment or proceeds from a third party to pay Consultant and Client does not pay Consultant's invoice within 60 days of receipt, Consultant may communicate directly with such third party to secure payment.
- (c) If the Client objects to an invoice, it must advise the Consultant in writing giving its reasons within 14 days of receipt of the invoice or the Client's objections will be waived, and the invoice shall conclusively be deemed due and owing. If the Client objects to only a portion of the invoice, payment for all other portions remains due within 25 days of receipt.
- (d) The Client agrees that the payment to the Consultant is not subject to any contingency or condition. The Consultant may negotiate payment of any check tendered by the Client, even if the words "in full satisfaction" or words intended to have similar effect appear on the check without such negotiation being an accord and satisfaction of any disputed debt and without prejudicing any right of the Consultant to collect additional amounts from the Client.
- (5) **Use of Documents.** All documents, including but not limited to drawings, specifications, reports, and data or programs stored electronically, prepared by the Consultant are related exclusively to the services described in this Agreement, and may be used only if the Client has satisfied all of its obligations under this Agreement. They are not intended or represented to be suitable for use, partial use or reuse by the Client or others on extensions of this project or on any other project. Any modifications made by the Client to any of the Consultant's documents, or any use, partial use or reuse of the documents without written authorization or adaptation by the Consultant will be at the Client's sole

risk and without liability to the Consultant, and the Client shall indemnify, defend and hold the Consultant harmless from all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including but not limited to attorneys' fees, resulting therefrom. The Consultant's electronic files and source code developed in the development of application code remain the property of the Consultant and shall be provided to the Client only if expressly provided for in this Agreement. Any electronic files not containing an electronic seal are provided only for the convenience of the Client, and use of them is at the Client's sole risk. In the case of any defects in the electronic files or any discrepancies between them and the hardcopy of the documents prepared by the Consultant, the hardcopy shall govern. Because data stored in electronic media format can deteriorate or be modified without the Consultant's authorization, the Client has 60 days to perform acceptance tests, after which it shall be deemed to have accepted the data.

- (6) **Opinions of Cost.** Because the Consultant does not control the cost of labor, materials, equipment or services furnished by others, methods of determining prices, or competitive bidding or market conditions, any opinions rendered as to costs, including but not limited to opinions as to the costs of construction and materials, shall be made on the basis of its experience and represent its judgment as an experienced and qualified professional, familiar with the industry. The Consultant cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids or actual costs will not vary from its opinions of cost. If the Client wishes greater assurance as to the amount of any cost, it shall employ an independent cost estimator. Consultant's services required to bring costs within any limitation established by the Client will be paid for as Additional Services.
- (7) **Termination.** The obligation to provide further services under this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon seven days' written notice in the event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the terms hereof through no fault of the terminating party, or upon thirty days' written notice for the convenience of the terminating party. If any change occurs in the ownership of the Client, the Consultant shall have the right to immediately terminate this Agreement. In the event of any termination, the Consultant shall be paid for all services rendered and expenses incurred to the effective date of termination, and other reasonable expenses incurred by the Consultant as a result of such termination. If the Consultant's compensation is a fixed fee, the amount payable for services will be a proportional amount of the total fee based on the ratio of the amount of the services performed, as reasonably determined by the Consultant, to the total amount of services which were to have been performed.
- (8) **Insurance.** The Consultant carries Workers' Compensation insurance, professional liability insurance, and general liability insurance. If the Client directs the Consultant to obtain increased insurance coverage, the Consultant will take out such additional insurance, if obtainable, at the Client's expense.
- (9) **Standard of Care.** The standard of care applicable to Consultant's services will be the degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised by consultants performing the same or similar services in the same locality at the time the services are provided. No warranty, express or implied, is made or intended by the Consultant's undertaking herein or its performance of services, and it is agreed that the Consultant is not a fiduciary with respect to the Client.
- (10) **LIMITATION OF LIABILITY.** In recognition of the relative risks and benefits of the Project to the Client and the Consultant, the risks have been allocated such that the Client agrees, to the fullest extent of the law, and notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement or the existence of applicable insurance coverage, that the total liability, in the aggregate, of the Consultant and the Consultant's officers, directors, employees, agents, and subconsultants to the Client or to anyone claiming by, through or under the Client, for any and all claims, losses, costs or damages whatsoever arising out of, resulting from or in any way related to the services under this Agreement from any cause or causes, including but not limited to, the negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability or breach of contract or any warranty, express or implied, of the Consultant or the Consultant's officers, directors, employees, agents, and subconsultants, shall not exceed twice the total compensation received by the Consultant under this Agreement or \$50,000, whichever is greater. Higher limits of liability may be negotiated for additional fee. Under no circumstances shall the Consultant be liable for extra costs or other consequences due to changed conditions, or for costs related to the failure of contractors to perform work in accordance with the plans and specifications. This Section 10 is intended solely to limit the remedies available to the Client or those claiming by or through the Client, and nothing in this Section 10 shall require the Client to indemnify the Consultant.
- (11) **Mutual Waiver of Consequential Damages.** In no event shall either party be liable to the other for any consequential, incidental, punitive, or indirect damages including but not limited to loss of income or loss of profits.
- (12) **Certifications.** The Consultant shall not be required to execute certifications or third-party reliance letters that are inaccurate, that relate to facts of which the Consultant does not have actual knowledge, or that would cause the Consultant to violate applicable rules of professional responsibility.
- (13) **Dispute Resolution.** All claims by the Client arising out of this Agreement or its breach shall be submitted first to mediation in accordance with the Construction Industry Mediation Procedures of the American Arbitration Association as a condition precedent to litigation. Any mediation or civil action by Client must be commenced within one year of the accrual of the cause of action asserted but in no event later than allowed by applicable statutes.

(14) **Hazardous Substances and Conditions.** In no event shall Consultant be a custodian, transporter, handler, arranger, contractor, or remediator with respect to hazardous substances and conditions. Consultant's services will be limited to professional analysis, recommendations, and reporting, including, when agreed to, plans and specifications for isolation, removal, or remediation. The Consultant shall notify the Client of hazardous substances or conditions not contemplated in the scope of services of which the Consultant actually becomes aware. Upon such notice by the Consultant, the Consultant may stop affected portions of its services until the hazardous substance or condition is eliminated.

#### (15) Construction Phase Services.

- (a) If the Consultant's services include the preparation of documents to be used for construction and the Consultant is not retained to make periodic site visits, the Client assumes all responsibility for interpretation of the documents and for construction observation, and the Client waives any claims against the Consultant in any way connected thereto.
- (b) If the Consultant provides construction phase services, the Consultant shall have no responsibility for any contractor's means, methods, techniques, equipment choice and usage, sequence, schedule, safety programs, or safety practices, nor shall Consultant have any authority or responsibility to stop or direct the work of any contractor. The Consultant's visits will be for the purpose of endeavoring to provide the Client a greater degree of confidence that the completed work of its contractors will generally conform to the construction documents prepared by the Consultant. Consultant neither guarantees the performance of contractors, nor assumes responsibility for any contractor's failure to perform its work in accordance with the contract documents.
- (c) The Consultant is not responsible for any duties assigned to the design professional in the construction contract that are not expressly provided for in this Agreement. The Client agrees that each contract with any contractor shall state that the contractor shall be solely responsible for job site safety and for its means and methods; that the contractor shall indemnify the Client and the Consultant for all claims and liability arising out of job site accidents; and that the Client and the Consultant shall be made additional insureds under the contractor's general liability insurance policy.
- (16) **No Third-Party Beneficiaries; Assignment and Subcontracting.** This Agreement gives no rights or benefits to anyone other than the Client and the Consultant, and all duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole benefit of the Client and the Consultant. The Client shall not assign or transfer any rights under or interest in this Agreement, or any claim arising out of the performance of services by Consultant, without the written consent of the Consultant. The Consultant reserves the right to augment its staff with subconsultants as it deems appropriate due to project logistics, schedules, or market conditions. If the Consultant exercises this right, the Consultant will maintain the agreed-upon billing rates for services identified in the contract, regardless of whether the services are provided by in-house employees, contract employees, or independent subconsultants.
- (17) **Confidentiality.** The Client consents to the use and dissemination by the Consultant of photographs of the project and to the use by the Consultant of facts, data and information obtained by the Consultant in the performance of its services. If, however, any facts, data or information are specifically identified in writing by the Client as confidential, the Consultant shall use reasonable care to maintain the confidentiality of that material.
- (18) **Miscellaneous Provisions.** This Agreement is to be governed by the law of the State of California. This Agreement contains the entire and fully integrated agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous negotiations, representations, agreements or understandings, whether written or oral. Except as provided in Section 1, this Agreement can be supplemented or amended only by a written document executed by both parties. Provided, however, that any conflicting or additional terms on any purchase order issued by the Client shall be void and are hereby expressly rejected by the Consultant. Any provision in this Agreement that is unenforceable shall be ineffective to the extent of such unenforceability without invalidating the remaining provisions. The non-enforcement of any provision by either party shall not constitute a waiver of that provision nor shall it affect the enforceability of that provision or of the remainder of this Agreement.

# COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT TransNet Funds Contribution

# **RECITALS**

- 1. PARTIES are authorized to enter into a cooperative agreement for improvements to the State Highway System (SHS) per the California Streets and Highways Code sections 114 and 130.
- 2. The term AGREEMENT, as used herein, includes any attachments, exhibits, and amendments.
- 3. SAN ELIJO JPA intends to design a bicycle-pedestrian node and the North Coast Bike Trail from the southerly to the northerly limits of SAN ELIJO JP A property and is referred to herein as PROJECT. PROJECT is located outside of the SHS (See Attachment A).
- 4. PROJECT is a one of the Community Enhancements in the City of Encinitas preliminarily identified in the CALTRANS Interstate 5 (I-5) North Coast Corridor (NCC) Final Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement (EIR/EIS).
- 5. PROJECT is included in the NCC Public Works Plan/Transportation Resource Enhancement Program (1-5 NCC POW/TREP).
- 6. CALTRANS has an environmental and I-5 NCC PWP/TREP commitment to the California Coastal Commission to ensure that PROJECT is constructed by the year 2020 (See Attachment B).
- 7. The I-5 NCC EIR/EIS is listed and funding identified on Table 1, MPO ID: CAL09, Amendment 16-13 of the 2016 Regional Transportation Improvement Program. (See Attachment C).
- 8. CALTRANS will contribute to SAN ELIJO JP A the amount of \$450,000 from TransNet funds required for design and permitting of PROJECT.

- 9. CALTRANS and SAN ELIJO JPA will enter into a separate construction agreement for PROJECT.
- 10. SAN ELIJO JPA will enter into a separate agreement with the City of Encinitas for the maintenance of the PROJECT.
- 11. PARTIES hereby set forth the terms, covenants, and conditions for CALTRANS' contribution toward PROJECT.

# **SCOPE**

- 12. SAN ELIJO JPA is responsible for completing all environmental, permits, right of way and design, including specifications, for PROJECT.
- 13. CALTRANS will provide design oversight for PROJECT.
- 14. SAN ELIJO JPA will make all necessary arrangements with utility owners for the timely accommodation, protection, relocation, or removal of any existing utility facilities that conflict with construction of PROJECT.
- 15. CALTRANS will contribute the fixed amount of \$450,000 for design and permitting of PROJECT from TransNet funds.

# **INVOICE & PAYMENT**

- 16. SAN ELIJO JPA will invoice CALTRANS for the amount of \$450,000 after execution of this Agreement.
- 17. CALTRANS will pay SAN ELIJO JPA within 90 (ninety) calendar days of receipt of invoice.
- 18. PARTIES agree that the total amount of TransNet funds paid out to SAN ELIJO JPA will not exceed \$450,000. If the fixed amounts listed in the SCOPE are exceeded, the SAN ELIJO JPA will provide documentation and PARTIES will amend this agreement. After execution of amendment the SAN ELIJO JPA will invoice CALTRANS for the specified amendment amount and CALTRANS will pay SAN ELIJO JPA within 90 (ninety) calendar days of receipt of invoice.
- 19. After PARTIES agree that all work for PROJECT is complete, SAN ELIJO JPA will submit a final accounting for all costs. Based on the final accounting, SAN ELIJO JPA will refund or invoice as necessary in order to satisfy the financial commitment of this AGREEMENT.

# **GENERAL CONDITIONS**

- 20. All obligations of CALTRANS under the terms of AGREEMENT are subject to the appropriation of resources by the Legislature, the State Budget Act authority, and the allocation of funds by the California Transportation Commission.
- 21. If SAN ELIJO JPA fails to complete the PROJECT by January 1, 2021 for any reason, other than causes beyond its control, SAN ELIJO JP A will refund the full amount of CALTRANS' contribution.
- 22. SAN ELIJO JPA will retain all PROJECT related records for four (4) years after the final payment.
- 23. HM-1 is hazardous material (including, but not limited to, hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law, whether it is disturbed by the PROJECT or not.
- 24. HM-2 is hazardous material (including, but not limited to, hazardous waste) that may require removal and disposal pursuant to federal or state law only if disturbed by the PROJECT.
- 25. The management activities related to HM-1 and HM-2, including and without limitation, any necessary manifest requirements and disposal facility designations are referred to herein as HM-1 MANAGEMENT and HM-2 MANAGEMENT respectively.
- 26. If HM-1 or HM-2 is found during construction, SAN ELIJO JPA will immediately notify CALTRANS.
- 27. CALTRANS, independent of PROJECT, is responsible for any HM-1 found within the existing SHS right of way. CALTRANS will undertake, or cause to be undertaken, HM-1 MANAGEMENT with minimum impact to PROJECT schedule.
  - CALTRANS, independent of PROJECT will pay, or cause to be paid, the cost of HM-1 MANAGEMENT related to HM-1 found within the existing SHS right of way.
- 28. If HM-1 is found within the PROJECT limits and outside the existing SHS right of way, responsibility for such HM-1 rests with the owner(s) of the parcel(s) on which the HM-1 is found. SAN ELIJO JPA, in concert with the local agency having land use jurisdiction, will ensure that HM-I MANAGEMENT is undertaken with minimum impact to PROJECT schedule.
  - The cost of HM-1 MANAGEMENT for HM-I found within the PROJECT limits and outside the existing SHS right of way will be the responsibility of the owner(s) of the parcel(s) where the HM-I is located.
- 29. SAN ELIJO JPA is responsible for HM-2 MANAGEMENT within the PROJECT limits.

- 30. HM-2 MANAGEMENT costs are PROJECT costs.
- 31. Neither SAN ELIJO JPA nor its member agencies, nor any officer or employee thereof, is responsible for any injury, damage, or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CALTRANS, its contractors, sub-contractors, and/or its agents under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon CALTRANS under AGREEMENT. It is understood and agreed that CALTRANS, to the extent permitted by law, will defend, indemnify, and save harmless SAN ELIJO JPA and all of its officers, employees, and member agencies from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description brought forth under, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation, or other theories and assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by CALTRANS, its contractors, sub-contractors, and/or its agents under AGREEMENT.
- 32. Neither CALTRANS nor any officer or employee thereof is responsible for any injury, damage, or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by SAN ELIJO JPA, its contractors, sub-contractors, and/or its agents under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction conferred upon SAN ELIJO JPA under AGREEMENT. It is understood and agreed that SAN ELIJO JPA, to the extent permitted by law, will defend, indemnify, and save harmless CALTRANS and all of its officers and employees from all claims, suits, or actions of every name, kind, and description brought forth under, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation, or other theories and assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by SAN ELIJO JPA, its contractors, sub-contractors, and/or its agents under AGREEMENT.
- 33. If the work performed on PROJECT is done under contract and falls within the Labor Code section 1720(a)(1) definition of "public works" in that it is construction, alteration, demolition, installation, or repair; or maintenance work under Labor Code section 1771 SAN ELIJO JP A must conform to the provisions of Labor Code sections 1720 through 1815, and all applicable provisions of California Code of Regulations found in Title 8, Chapter 8, Subchapter 3, Articles 1-7. SAN ELIJO JPA agrees to include prevailing wage requirements in its contracts for public work. Work performed by SAN ELIJO JPA's own forces is exempt from the Labor Code's Prevailing Wage requirements.
  - SAN ELIJO JPA shall require its contractors to include prevailing wage requirements in all subcontracts funded by AGREEMENT when the work to be performed by the subcontractor is "public works" as defined in Labor Code Section 1720(a)(l) and Labor Code Section 1771. Subcontracts shall include all prevailing wage requirements set forth in SAN ELIJO JPA contracts.
- 34. AGREEMENT is intended to be PARTIES final expression and supersedes all prior oral understandings pertaining to PROJECT.
- 35. Unless otherwise documented in a maintenance agreement, SAN ELIJO JPA will maintain all PROJECT improvements.

36. AGREEMENT will terminate upon CALTRANS' acceptance of PROJECT. However, all indemnification and maintenance articles of AGREEMENT will remain in effect until terminated or modified in writing by mutual agreement.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

No action required. This memorandum is submitted for information only.

# **BACKGROUND**

The San Elijo Joint Powers Authority (SEJPA) has a responsibility to maintain permit compliance with regulatory agencies and legal agreements with customers to provide wastewater and recycled water services. Proactive asset management and capital improvement planning are key components in keeping these commitments.

In 2014, SEJPA retained the services of Carollo Engineers to conduct an evaluation of the wastewater and recycled water capital assets owned by the SEJPA at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility.

The results of the evaluation and Carollo's recommendations were documented in the 2015 Facility Plan. Recommended projects were prioritized using a "triple-bottom line" approach to evaluate and weight each project against the others using three main factors:

- Financial (30%): Implement cost effective projects and solutions. Maximize economic benefits for customers through cost-effective operations.
- Environmental (35%): Meet or exceed permit requirements and minimize reportable violations. Improve habitat and minimize impacts to the environment.
- Social (35%): Maintain a high standard of work safety and maximize community benefits through improved aesthetics and recreational uses.

The recommendations from the 2015 Facility Plan created the foundation for the SEJPA Capital Improvement Program, which includes regulatory compliance analysis, risk assessment for system failure, project prioritization, and budgetary cost estimates.

In 2017, the SEJPA successfully secured \$23.9 million in a bond offering to fund the completion of the majority of recommended capital projects. Staff bundled the projects into four phases in

order to prioritize capital spending, streamline project delivery, minimize community impacts, and reduce cost through economies of scale.

### DISCUSSION

Phase I of the SEJPA Capital Improvement Program is currently in construction and includes the Land Outfall Replacement, Preliminary Treatment Upgrades, and Odor Control Improvements.

- The Land Outfall Replacement project replaced the existing 30-inch diameter asbestosconcrete land outfall pipeline that was installed in 1965. The new pipeline has an installation length of approximately 2,600 linear feet, is constructed of high density polyethylene (HDPE), and installed at a greater depth than the original pipeline to minimize conflicts with other buried utilities and future construction projects.
- The Preliminary Treatment and Odor Control projects have been combined into one
  construction contract. This project will replace or improve existing treatment equipment
  and tanks associated with the initial treatment process (referred to as Preliminary
  Treatment) at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility. In addition, improvements will be
  made to the odor control system that services this area of the facility.

Phase II is currently in the design and permitting stage, and consists primarily of a bundle of projects referred to as the Building and Site Improvements Program, which includes the following:

- New buildings
- Road and parking improvements
- Fire system modernization
- Solar power generation
- Storm water conveyance, attenuation, and treatment improvements
- New perimeter security fencing
- Potential regional bike/pedestrian path and traffic control improvements on Manchester Avenue in cooperation with Caltrans and the City of Encinitas

Staff is currently seeking qualifications from construction firms that are experienced with the type of work proposed and the CMAR alternative delivery method in order to expedite the project schedule and control project costs. Coordination with resource agencies is also underway to define project permitting requirements. The SEJPA and Caltrans developed a cooperative agreement (CA) for engineering and environmental services that was recently finalized. The CA for construction cost is in development. Delays on Caltrans' work elements have impinged the overall Building and Site Improvement project schedule, and staff is evaluating options for schedule recovery.

Phase II also includes Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) recycled water pipelines, electrical upgrades to power distribution system MS-2, and hardware and software improvements to the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system.

The IRWM recycled water pipelines, also known as the Encinitas Ranch Recycled Water Expansion project, was advertised for construction bids in July and awarded in August to

Burtech Pipeline, Inc. Construction is anticipated to begin in October, with a likely construction duration of 6 months. Staff pre-purchased the booster pump equipment for the project in order to shorten the construction duration and minimize impacts to the community. The pump vendor is currently preparing submittals for approval prior to fabrication.

The 2018 SCADA Upgrade project was advertised for construction bids in July, and bids were opened in August. Staff is recommending award of the project to the Board in a separate staff report. The project is anticipated to begin in September 2018, with a construction duration of approximately 7 months. In order to maximize potential project synergies and minimize costs, staff is considering consolidation of the electrical project into the Building and Site Improvements Program.

Phase III, the Solids Treatment Project, is in the pre-design phase. A Project Definition Report (PDR) is currently in development to provide an evaluation of the design alternatives and a preferred project for final design. Design is expected to be complete by the fourth quarter of 2019, with bidding and construction beginning first quarter of 2020.

Phase IV consists of Resource Recovery and Reuse projects including water storage, process optimization, and energy efficiency projects. This phase is currently in early stages of research and development.

# FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no overall financial impact associated with this staff report. Budget and funding adjustments will be made as these capital projects are developed, awarded, and constructed. The 2017 Clean Water Bonds and grant funding, combined with current and future cash contributions for capital projects, is the financial basis for the SEJPA Capital Improvement Program.

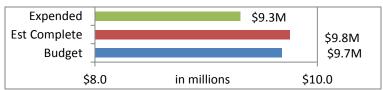

The work includes installation of (approximate lengths) 2,600 feet of 30-inch diameter HDPE pipe via horizontal directional drilling (HDD), 400 feet of 30-inch pipe via open trench construction, 300 feet of dual 10-inch force mains via open trench construction, and 110 feet of 60-inch steel casing under Coast Highway. The HDD began at Cardiff State Beach, continued beneath Coast Highway (through the steel casing), the San Elijo Lagoon, NCTD railroad, the Nature Center, and Manchester Avenue before daylighting at the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility (SEWRF). Tie-ins to the new pipeline were made at the beach and at the SEWRF. Project work sites will be restored after all work is complete.

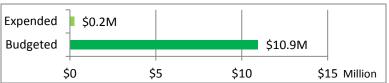

Schedule A includes construction of a booster pump station and recycled water pipeline extension. The project is a key component of the SEJPA's \$2.5M IRWM grant. The project is anticipated to offset 45 acre-feet per year of potable water use for landscape irrigation or approximately 50% of the total IRWM project potable water offset. Schedule B includes construction of 1,100 feet of 6-inch pipeline intended to serve HOA's along Requeza Street.

## Work Completed: May 2018 - August 2018

Obtained Coastal Development permit. Finalized Booster Pump Station architectural design with ERGA. Executed easement documents with ERCA, ERGA, SDWD, and Foxpoint Farms. Finalized agreements to provide construction laydown yards adjacent to the pipeline alignments. Advertised and awarded the contract for the pump skid to expedite project schedule. Pump vendor is currently obtaining submittals for review and approval prior to order placement. Project advertised and awarded to Burtech Pipeline. Burtech is currently obtaining all necessary bonds and insurances.

## **Planned Work: September 2018**

Finalize contract documents with Burtech. Conduct pre-construction meeting with Contractor and issue official Notice to Proceed. Begin submittal approval process for project equipment and materials.

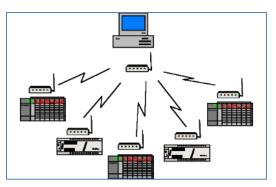

Meeting with Requeza Street HOA's to determine if Schedule B will be awarded. Begin public outreach and coordination effort with the Encinitas Ranch community.



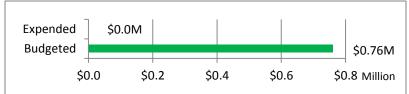

### **Project Description**

The Work consists of SCADA System improvements including new hardware, software, programming, equipment installation, system testing and commissioning, warranty, training and support services. Hardware includes servers, data historians, monitors, programmable logic controllers, and equipment panels. Software to replace 11 workstations with remote terminals will also be supplied. Programming, hardware/software, and equipment installation will be performed at six functional areas within the San Elijo Water Reclamation Facility and at five wastewater pump stations located within the cities of Encinitas and Solana Beach. Cybersecurity enhancements are also included to help identify, protect, detect, respond, and recover from cyber threats.

#### Work Completed: May 2018 – August 2018

Carollo Engineers completed the bidding documents and issued a request for bids to two pre-qualified SCADA integration companies. SEJPA conducted a pre-bid meeting and site walk for the project on August 2, 2018 and publicly opened bids on August 23, 2018.

#### Planned Work: September 2018

Consider award of contract to lowest responsive and responsible bidder at the September 10, 2018 Board meeting. If bid is accepted, issue notice of award and project contract for execution. Conduct kickoff meeting with the SCADA project team.
